BOARD AND CEO'S REPORT



2022 will go down as arguably one of TTA's greatest ever years, especially in relation to high performance and international results.

As the year comes to a close, it's important to look back and reflect on some of the achievements throughout the year. Highlights from 2022 include, but are not limited to:

HIGH PERFORMANCE AND PATHWAYS:

- Our best ever Commonwealth Games results were achieved, winning 1 gold, 3 silver and 2 bronze medals, plus 2 x 4th place results.
- Our best ever World Para Championships results were achieved, winning 2 gold, 2 silver and 2 bronze medals, plus 1 x 4th place result.
- Our best ever World Youth Championships results were achieved, winning 1 silver and 1 bronze medal, plus 2 quarter final results. This was the first time we have ever won medals at the World Youth Championships in the 20-year history of the event.
- Our best ever ITTF-Oceania Championships results were achieved, winning 28 out of 28 gold medals on offer and 67 medals in total. This is the best ever result by any country in the 44-year history of the event.
- Australian athletes competed in a record 33 international events throughout the year, winning a record 125 medals.
- 5 Australian athletes finished the year in the top 100 world rankings (senior), including Yangzi Liu (WR31 in Women's) and Nicholas Lum (WR42 in Men's) achieving the best ever world rankings by Australian athletes.
- 5 Australian athletes finished the year in the top 10 world rankings (para), including Qian Yang finishing 2022 ranked as number 1 in the world (Class 10 Women's).
- During the year, Nicholas Lum was the first ever Australian to reach number 1 in the world rankings in able-bodied (Under 17 Boys').
- National Squad training continued to go from strength to strength, with record training hours continuing to be offered in Melbourne and Sydney.
- Hopes Programs and Talent ID initiatives were held in 7 States/Territories, attracting more than 230 participants, serving as an important vehicle in providing opportunities for all parts of the high performance pathway.
- The Para Pathways Program was rolled out across 12 centres in 7 States/Territories, delivering 150 new participants; plus the first ever National Para Pathway Camp was conducted with 9 new Para Pathway athletes.
- 14 new para athletes were classified ahead of the 2022 National Championships and the new provisional classification process was also successfully rolled out across all States/Territories.
- Player of the Year awards went to: Yangzi Liu (Senior – Victor Barna Memorial Trophy), Qian Yang (Para – Arthur Wilks Award), Nicholas Lum (Junior – Michael Szabados Award), and Craig Campbell (Veterans – Ken Cole Trophy).

PARTICIPATION AND DEVELOPMENT:

- The TTA Equipment and Facilities Grant Program was successfully rolled out for a fifth consecutive year. 15 clubs/associations from 7 States/Territories received grants, which resulted in more than \$95,000 worth of equipment and facilities being injected into the table tennis community. Cumulatively across the five years of the program to date, more than \$440,000 worth of equipment and facilities have been distributed to 69 clubs/associations across all 8 States/Territories.
- 12 outstanding contributors to the sport were honoured through the National Volunteer and Coaches Awards Program. Mick Coughlan (QLD) had the honour of being awarded the Bev and Brian James Trophy as the 2022 National Volunteer of the Year.
- Membership rebounded very strongly to exceed pre-COVID numbers, with 10,440 members recorded through the 2022 Census.
- A new Participation record was set, with 200,543 participants recorded through the 2022 census. This easily eclipses the previous record of 168,560 set in 2019.
- Our entry level program, Spinneroos, continued to be rolled out at both club and school level throughout Australia.
- Our Sporting Schools program continued to be rolled out across Australia, with more than 22,000 students undertaking the program.

NATIONAL EVENTS:

- 2022 saw the return to a full calendar of national events for the first time since 2019, with 8 highly successful national events delivered across 6 States/Territories.
- The National Senior, Youth, Junior and Para Championships were combined into one all-inclusive event for the first time. The event attracted 445 competitors and nearly 1,900 individual event entries from all States/Territories.
- The National Veterans Championships attracted 310 competitors and nearly 1,200 individual event entries from all States/Territories and New Zealand.
- After a pilot event in 2021, the TTA Tour was expanded to cover 4 events in 2022 (Canberra, Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane). Overall, the event series was a roaring success, attracting nearly 600 competitors and more than 1,100 individual event entries from 7 States/Territories plus New Zealand.
- The National Hopes Week & Challenge attracted a record 76 entries from 7 States/Territories and continues to set the benchmark in terms of sourcing the next generation of players.
- The Commonwealth Games Qualification Tournament served to determine the final men's and women's places on the 2022 Commonwealth Games team and provided high calibre table tennis throughout.
- 7 national events were livestreamed with outstanding statistics being generated. 91,000 unique viewers and 118,000 total views watched 318,000 minutes (5,300 hours) of footage in more than 30 countries. Social media posts (Facebook) reached 482,000 people across more than 206 posts. Finally, 560,000 website hits were achieved.

GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE:

- The 2019-2022 TTA Strategic Plan came to an end, with significant and sustainable progress being made across all elements of the plan.
- The 2023-2025 TTA Strategic Plan was finalised and is now ready to be rolled out over the next three years. TTA is working with all States/Territories to ensure that State/Territory Strategic Plans align with TTA's, but maintain a localised focus where beneficial. This will ensure that a unified strategic direction will remain in place across the sport for the next 3 years, which will continue to underpin collaboration across the sport.
- 2021-2022 MOUs that TTA entered into with TTACT, TTNSW, TTNT, TTT and TTWA concluded. TTA is hopeful to enter into MOUs with all States/Territories for the 2023-2025 period to further strengthen collaboration between TTA and States/Territories.
- A fifth surplus (\$144,000) was delivered and the TTA Cash Reserves Target of \$575,000 has been met. The 2022 financial result reinforces the benefits of the financial reforms implemented over the past five years and demonstrates that TTA's business model continues to be robust.
- Importantly, with the TTA Cash Reserves target being met, the need to generate surplus results will diminish, meaning more resources can be put into further developing the sport.

RECOGNITION INITIATIVES:

- Five players made their international debut (Able-Bodied) and were recognised as Official Australian Representatives. Congratulations to Min Hyung Jee, Yangzi Liu, Nicholas Lum, Finn Luu and Alex Lee. The Official Australian Representative tallies now sit at 78 (Able-Bodied Men), 70 (Able-Bodied Women), 73 (Para Men) and 31 (Para Women).
- Two icons of Australian table tennis were inducted into the TTA Hall of Fame: Russell Lavale (Athletes – Open) and Noel Shorter (Coaches). Congratulations Russell and Noel, you're most worthy inductees.

Delivering results of this nature requires the help and support of a broad network of people and organisations and it is important to thank those who have contributed along the way.

Sincere thanks go to all funding partners and peak bodies, namely the Australian Sports Commission and the AIS, Commonwealth Games Australia, Australian Olympic Committee, Paralympics Australia, ITTF and ITTF-Oceania. TTA enjoys a positive working relationship with all parties and looks forward to this continuing in 2023 and beyond.

Thank you also to all TTA's commercial partners. In particular our long-term partners Nittaku, DHS and Table Tennis World, plus all others who supported TTA throughout the year.

Of course, special thanks must go to all players and the parents of junior players. We run the sport to provide opportunities for people to play, and the sport would not function without you playing from the highest level, right through to grass roots level.

Thank you also to State/Territory Associations for working collaboratively for the betterment of the sport once again in 2022. The work that all parties have put into strengthening relationships between National and State/Territory level in recent years has undoubtedly been beneficial for the health of the sport overall. It is clear the underlying theme is a willingness to help each other maximise the finite resources available across Australian table tennis and the increased sense of unity is appreciated by TTA.

The work at club/association and State/Territory level, by volunteers and staff, to grow participation and deliver local competitions and activities is the bedrock of the sport – thank you, we couldn't progress without you.

High praise is deserved by all TTA staff, who once again performed with distinction. TTA are fortunate to have staff who are both extremely dedicated and exceptionally capable. They always focus on the job at hand to service stakeholders and maximise finite resources. The passion, work ethic and commitment of the TTA staff is both acknowledged and appreciated.

Special mention goes to everyone who serves on TTA Board Sub-Committees. It is not lost on TTA that you all volunteer your time to help the sport you love and, in some instances, this can be a thankless task. However, I express my sincere thanks for your ongoing contribution.

Finally, the TTA Board must be recognised. Advancing Australian table tennis remained firmly at the forefront of all decision making and the Board continued to function effectively and efficiently in a cohesive manner. The Board-CEO relationship is pivotal to the success of any organisation and the mutual trust and the ongoing strong working relationship is an essential element of TTA's strength.

Thank you once again to everyone for your contribution to our great game throughout 2022. Here's to another successful year in 2023.

MESSAGE FROM AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC COMMITTEE



What a transformative year 2022 was for the Australian Olympic Committee.

The year began with a record-breaking achievement for an Australian Olympic Winter Team with four medals at the Beijing 2022 Games. Jakara Anthony's gold in the Moguls, Jackie Narracott and Scotty James winning silver in the Skeleton and Halfpipe respectively, and a bronze for Tess Coady in the Slopestyle.

This was Australia's best result ever at a winter Games and all in the shadows of the ongoing COVID environment that added layers of complexity, as it did the previous year in Tokyo. Australia's standing in the Winter Olympic community continues to grow.

April heralded the end of John Coates's 32-year Presidency. A legacy of quite extraordinary achievement and service to the Olympic movement in Australia.

With Ian Chesterman's election as the new President, the AOC is building on John's legacy, particularly as we embarked on the Green and Gold Runway towards the Brisbane 2032 Olympic Games.

We celebrated the start of the ten-year runway in 2022 with multiple major international sports events held in Australia and the promise of many more before Australia hosts an Olympic Games for the third time.

Planning for the next Games – Paris 2024 – also commenced in earnest with several key appointments. Olympic champion Anna Meares has hit the ground running, taking on the key role as Chef de Mission for Paris. And Dr Caroline Broderick will become the Australia Team's first female Medical Director.

After a record 16 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander athletes competed in Tokyo 2020, the AOC's Indigenous Strategy enters another exciting phase.

Our ambition to achieve practical outcomes for our First Nations people is captured in our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) and we delivered with our first Indigenous coaching scholarships completed this year.

In 2022 we began the transition from the inaugural "Reflect" RAP to the next "Innovate" RAP as our reconciliation journey continues.

The AOC also delivered our inaugural Climate Change Action plan. This Plan commits us to achieving a 30% reduction in our emissions in 2024 and net zero by 2040. We look forward to working with and supporting all member sports in the time ahead as we collectively tackle the challenge climate poses to global sport. An important commitment for Brisbane 2032.

The AOC's signature community programmes also grew in stature in 2022. Olympics Unleashed passed a milestone of 250,000 students nationally who have heard directly from Olympians and Olympic hopefuls on goal setting and coping with adversity.

More than one thousand students applied to be part of the Australian Olympic Change-Maker summit in Canberra from which 24 were selected by a panel of Olympians. All had to nominate based on their positive contributions to making a difference in their schools and communities.

Those successful were awarded Change-Maker medals which were superbly crafted by the Royal Australian Mint. Our young leaders represent the future of the Olympic movement. They are drinking at the well built by others – such as Geoff Henke, who stood down as the Chair of the Olympic Winter Institute of Australia (OWIA).

The OWIA owes its existence to Geoff's persistence and vision and the success Australia has enjoyed in winter sport can be traced to the same wellspring.

Two Olympians were elected to the AOC Executive in 2022 - Alisa Camplin-Warner and Liz Scott.

They join fellow Olympians Evelyn Halls, who was elected AOC Vice President, Kitty Chiller and Michael Murphy who were re-elected plus Cate Campbell OAM and Ken Wallace OAM, who this year were elected Chair and Deputy Chair of the AOC Athletes' Commission, respectively.

As we focus our attention on Paris 2024 and beyond, the Olympic Movement in Australia is entering a time of change. Our 10+10 strategy will ensure not only the appropriate investment in sport can occur, but also that the sports industry plays a key role in policy development through to Brisbane 2032 and for a decade beyond.

It has also been a time of unprecedented cooperation between the AOC and our member sports through vehicles such as our CEO Forums and Presidents Forum, indeed at all levels, to ensure our mutual objectives can be achieved. We are very grateful that this understanding can contribute to our greatest goals – for our athletes to achieve their ambitions and for sport to play its critical role in our country's future.

MESSAGE FROM ITTF-OCEANIA

With the reduction in COVID-19 related restrictions we were able to conduct an increased number of events and activities and Australia participated strongly.

The highlight was undoubtedly the 2022 Oceania Senior and Youth Championships conducted for the first time ever at the Eastland Shopping Centre in Melbourne. Prior to the event, demonstrations were conducted in local schools by Australian representative players and a schools competition was held at Eastland. There was also a training camp for 60 athletes to assist in preparation for the Oceania Championships.

There was a record equalling attendance of 9 Oceania countries with 12,500 spectators over the week, the largest ever. Table Tennis Australia (TTA) had 11 officials participate, including the Referee and Deputy Referee.

The events featured continuous live streaming on 2 tables with a professional commentary team. Both the teams and men's and women's singles finals were broadcast on 7+. This was fantastic exposure for the sport and our elite table tennis athletes.

Australian athletes performed at their peak and broke all records by winning gold in all 28 events. Nicholas Lum reached a career high world rankings of 42 in the men and 8 in under 19 while Yangzi Liu reached an incredible ranking of 31 in the women.

Success in Oceania events did not end there for Australia with impressive results at the ITTF-Oceania Cup in Papua New Guinea. Nicholas Lum once again defeated Chris Yan to win the Men's Singles, while Min Hyung Jee won a cliff-hanger of a match against Yangzi Liu to win the Women's Singles.

The 2022 Oceania Hopes Week & Challenge was held at the Waikato Stadium in Hamilton, New Zealand with Australia's Lily Zhang securing the gold medal for the girls and a place in the World Hopes Challenge in France.

Leonard Piyachai performed with distinction achieving a bronze medal for the boys behind winner August Xiao and silver medallist Eli Ho, both from New Zealand.

Other notable achievements by Australian athletes in 2022 include:

- Commonwealth Games – 1 x gold, 3 x silver and 2 x bronze medals.
- World Para Championships – 2 x gold, 2 x silver and 2 x bronze medals.
- World Youth Championships – 1 x silver and 1 x bronze medals
- Nicholas Lum achieving a first for the Oceania region achieving the world number 1 ranking for under 17 boys.
- Qian Yang achieving the world number 1 ranking for para class 10 women.

TTA was able to hold a National Championships for the first time since 2019. This was the first integrated championship which included Senior, Junior & Para all under the same roof with 445 total participants with excellent female participation at 44.94%

There were 8 World Table Tennis Day activities conducted in Oceania, with 3 of them in Australia.

Table Tennis Australia has generously invited Oceania countries to participate in the Australian National Championships and also TTA Tour events. This is a great opportunity for athletes from throughout Oceania to compete with the best players in the region to compete and lift their performances.

TTA has strong representation on the ITTF-Oceania Management Committee with Anthony Moore (President) and Scott Houston (Management Committee Member

and ITTF Board of Directors representative). Both Anthony and Scott did presentations at our Oceania Governance Workshop, which were extremely well received. Our Australian Government (DFAT) funded Smash Down Barriers (SDB) table tennis disability program continues to deliver sport for development outcomes for people with disability.

With additional funding support from the ITTF para-activities were conducted in the following countries.

- Fiji
- Tonga
- New Caledonia
- Papua New Guinea

Under the SDB program additional funding support was provided to film a video based on our Bounce it Back schools program. We were fortunate to be able to engage Australian Para athletes Trevor Hirth and Melissa Tapper for filming in both Fiji and Tonga. The video is scheduled for completion in 2023 and will be a fantastic resource for schools in the Pacific.

We continued to support Fiji and Tonga through the Oceania Develop a National Association (DNA) program, whereby countries are provided administration and governance support. The program is co-funded by the Australian Government (DFAT).

We were able to provide a total of 10 equipment packages to Member Associations including competition packages for both New Caledonia and Tahiti to support the hosting of the Melanesia and Polynesia Regional Championships. Equipment support is critical to the development of table tennis in the Pacific and encourages participation.

We appreciate the support and close relationship with Table Tennis Australia and hope to work together on more initiatives to strengthen table tennis in Oceania.

We are grateful for the support provided by the Australian Government (DFAT), through the Pacific Sports Partnership. Funding for the Smash Down Barriers program exceeded A\$200,000 in 2022, and the Australian Government remains an invaluable partner of our sport-for-development initiatives.

ITTF-Oceania would like to thank the ITTF, OSFO, various Member Association National Olympic Committees, ONOC as well as Olympic Solidarity for their ongoing contribution to the sustainable development of table tennis in Oceania. Additionally, ITTF-Oceania acknowledges the support of the Australian Government through Team Up to support the Smash Down Barriers table tennis disability program.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2022

NOTE 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out either in the respective notes or below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

NEW OR AMENDED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS ADOPTED

The company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the company. The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the company:

Conceptual Framework for Financial Reporting (Conceptual Framework)

The company has adopted the revised Conceptual Framework from 1 January 2022. The Conceptual Framework contains new definition and recognition criteria as well as new guidance on measurement that affects several Accounting Standards, but it has not had a material impact on the company's financial statements.

AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities

The company has adopted AASB 1060 from 1 January 2022. The standard provides a new Tier 2 reporting framework with simplified disclosures that are based on the requirements of IFRS for SMEs. The adoption of this standard did not result in any disclosure changes in the financial statements.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities.

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATION

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is Table Tennis Australia Limited's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign currency transactions

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Australian dollars using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at financial year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss.

INCOME TAX

As the company is a tax exempt institution in terms of subsection 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

CURRENT AND NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within

12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the company's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

INVESTMENTS AND OTHER FINANCIAL ASSETS

Investments and other financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Such assets are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on both the business model within which such assets are held and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset unless an accounting mismatch is being avoided.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, it's carrying value is written off.

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost only if both of the following conditions are met: (i) it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and (ii) the contractual terms of the financial asset represent contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest.

Investments

Investments includes non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturities where the company has the positive intention and ability to hold the financial asset to maturity. This category

excludes financial assets that are held for an undefined period. Investments are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method adjusted for any principal repayments. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired.

Impairment of financial assets

The company recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets which are either measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The measurement of the loss allowance depends upon the company's assessment at the end of each reporting period as to whether the financial instrument's credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, based on reasonable and supportable information that is available, without undue cost or effort to obtain.

Where there has not been a significant increase in exposure to credit risk since initial recognition, a 12-month expected credit loss allowance is estimated. This represents a portion of the asset's lifetime expected credit losses that is attributable to a default event that is possible within the next 12 months. Where a financial asset has become credit impaired or where it is determined that credit risk has increased significantly, the loss allowance is based on the asset's lifetime expected credit losses. The amount of expected credit loss recognised is measured on the basis of the probability weighted present value of anticipated cash shortfalls over the life of the instrument discounted at the original effective interest rate.

For financial assets mandatorily measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, the loss allowance is recognised in other comprehensive income with a corresponding expense through profit or loss. In all other cases, the loss allowance reduces the asset's carrying value with a corresponding expense through profit or loss.

IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX ('GST') AND OTHER SIMILAR TAXES

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority

is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

NOTE 2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses.

Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Revenue from contracts with customers

Judgement is exercised in determining whether the performance obligations in government grants are 'sufficiently specific' to enable the revenue to be recognised under accounting standard AASB 15 Revenue from contracts with customers. Revenue from grants that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance

obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at a point in time or overtime. Revenue received in advance is disclosed under current liabilities - contract liabilities. Refer note 3 and note 13.

Revenue from grants, that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the grant, or the right to receive the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the grant will flow to the company and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

Incremental borrowing rate

Where the interest rate implicit in a lease cannot be readily determined, an incremental borrowing rate is estimated to discount future lease payments to measure the present value of the lease liability at the lease commencement date. Such a rate is based on what the company estimates it would have to pay a third party to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset, with similar terms, security and economic environment.

ACCOUNTING POLICY FOR REVENUE RECOGNITION

The company recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the company is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the company: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into

account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

NOTE 3. REVENUE (CONTINUED)

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Sale of goods

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery.

Services rendered to members

Revenue derived from services delivered to members, includes membership registration fees, affiliation fees, educational income and player insurances (member service fees).

The company's membership and affiliation year is 1 January to 31 December, with fees payable annually in advance. Only those receipts that are attributable to the current financial year are recognised as revenue. Members pay in advance of receipt of services, which are delivered over a period of time.

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on either a fixed price or an hourly rate.

Grants

Grants that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at a point in time or overtime. Such grants are classified as revenue from contracts with customers.

In respect of grants that are identified as revenue from contracts with customers, the amounts received in advance of the performance obligation in the grant agreement being met are recognised as contract liabilities and presented under the classification of current liabilities. The grant is recognised as revenue only when the company has met the specified performance obligation in the grant agreement, and has transferred the agreed benefit to the grantor.

Revenue from grants, that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the grant, or the

right to receive the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the grant will flow to the company and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. Such grants are classified under Other revenue. Grants provided to acquire or construct capital assets are recognised as a liability until such time as the asset is acquired or constructed, at which point the grant is recognised as revenue.

Sponsorship

Sponsorships that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at a point in time or overtime. Such sponsorships are classified as revenue from contracts with customers.

In respect of sponsorships that are identified as revenue from contracts with customers, the amounts received in advance of the performance obligation in the sponsorship agreement being met are recognised as contract liabilities and presented under the classification of current liabilities. The sponsorship is recognised as revenue only when the company has met the specified performance obligation in the sponsorship agreement, and has transferred the agreed benefit to the sponsor.

Revenue from sponsorships that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the sponsorship, or the right to receive the sponsorship, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the sponsorship will flow to the company and the amount of the sponsorship can be measured reliably. Such sponsorships are classified under Other revenue.

Donations and other revenue

Donations and other revenue are recognised when they are received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

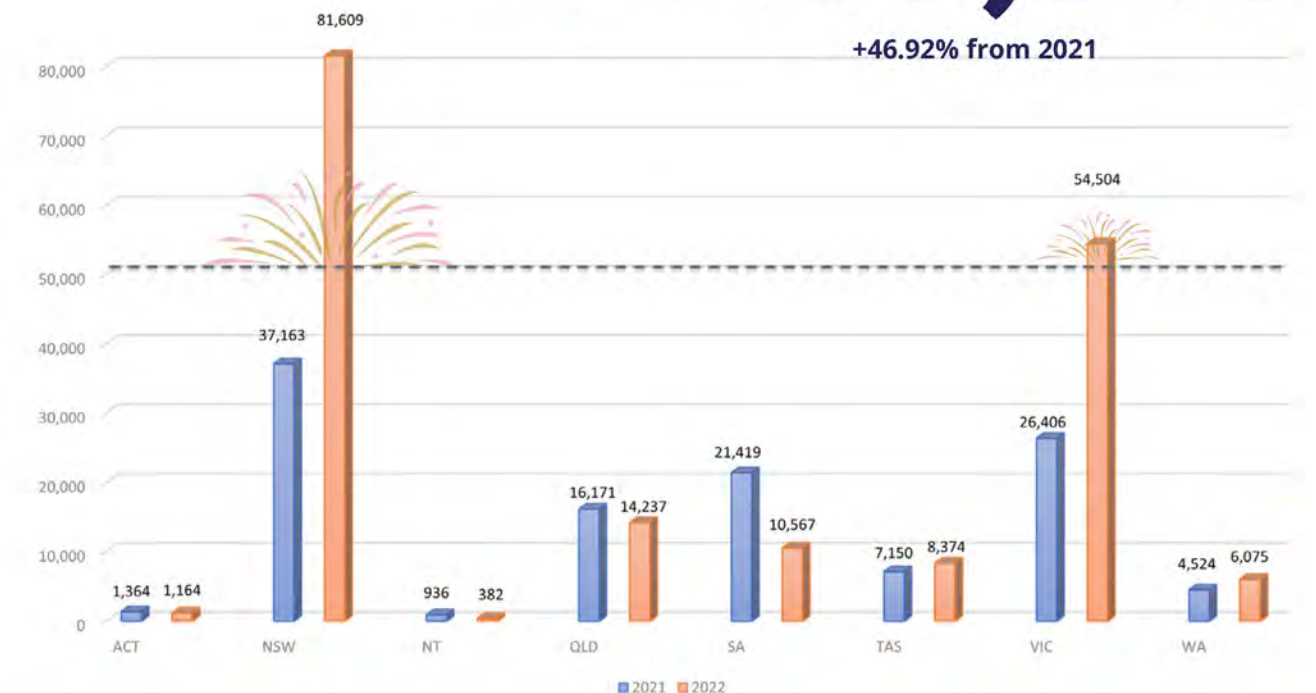

TABLE TENNIS ACT REPORT

Table Tennis ACT has had a strong 2022 with Head Coach, George Logothetis, joining the Club in January. There has been significant growth in club coaching with over 150 members participating in Group Coaching. For the first time the Club has offered Adult Coaching, Female Coaching and Minis coaching sessions. The Junior and Para Coaching program were expanded to provide players with multiple opportunities to train each week and Coaching Camps were held during school holidays, including National Pathway and Hopes Camp in January.

Membership has continued to grow (reaching 468 members including 183 new members). Free 'Come and Try' was offered at all Group Coaching sessions and proved popular with over 90 new people trying table tennis in 2022. Participation in competitions continued to grow with Pennant involving 180 different players throughout the year. A successful Super 12 Challenge Tournament was held in August and a new Top 24 Tournament was introduced (April). Canberra hosted its first TTA Tour event (March). The ACT Closed Championship was held in June (215 entrants) and the ACT Open held in September (471 entries) was highly successful. Twenty Night Social Competitions were held during school holidays and a new weekly Saturday Social Competition was introduced.

In addition to competition and coaching, the Club continued to provide many activities at Kingston, including Seniors Social Group (three mornings per week) and table bookings during open practice. Table tennis was offered in 2 other locations in Canberra – the Tuggeranong venue was enjoyed by many regulars on Sunday afternoon and Gungahlin (John Paul College II) was open Friday night and Saturday afternoon and trialled social competitions and Group coaching.

ACT representation was high (in terms of numbers participating and level of achievement) at many inter-state tournaments, including all TTA tours (Melbourne,

Sydney, Brisbane), National Championship (Caloundra), National Veterans (Darwin), NSW Country Invitational Championships (Gosford), and Southern Country Team Champions (Goulburn). ACT had its best ever result at a National Championships, winning its first Junior Nationals Team medal (silver) in the U17 boys and winning 1 silver and 3 bronze medals in Para. Bec Simpson also received Best Player Award Class 11 Women.

The Club focussed on school engagement for the Sporting Schools Program - providing coaching at 2 schools in Term 4. Over 50 students participated in the Annual Secondary Schools Championships held in July. Community awareness about the benefits and opportunities was raised through TTACT participating in community events such as "Youth Week" (April), 'Never Too Old to Play' event at Haig Park (September), "Scarlet Slam" charity corporate event (October) and Invictus Australia Family Day (November 2022).

In relation to facilities, minor upgrades were made to Kingston, a new venue was identified for 2023 (The Dome-Fadden) and discussions with ACT Government on a new fit-for-purpose table tennis facility continued. In 2022, TTACT continued to strengthen the Club's financial position to support growth through improved facilities. Strong governance continued to be a focus for TTACT, underpinned by an agreement with ACT Government and an MOU with Table Tennis Australia (TTA). Throughout the year, eight Board meetings were held (summary Board Minutes available on website), 50 "Table Talk" – all member emails, were sent out and an Annual Survey of Club members was undertaken. The Club employed required expertise (TTACT Head Coach, full time basis), delivered free Volunteer training (Coaching and Officials) and finalised its Table Tennis in the ACT Strategic Plan 2023-25.

TTACT congratulates George Logothetis on being recognised as the TTA Community Coach of the Year and for his selection as an Australian National Coach for the Australian Para Squad. Also congratulations to Song Chen who received a well deserved TTA Volunteer Award for 25 years of Service to Table Tennis.

TTACT received over \$45,000 in grants and would like to thank the following for their support: ACT Government (Sport and Recreation and Community Services grants), Table Tennis Australia (MOU, grants), and Successful Alliance (sponsorship). TTACT would also like to thank Melissa (Milly) Tapper for being our Club Ambassador in 2022.

A big thank you to all the members who contributed to a positive and progressive club environment throughout the year. Special mention goes to everyone on the TTACT Board and Sub-Committees (Kingston, Gungahlin, Tuggeranong, Pennant and Facilities) who have volunteered their time for the benefit of others. Thank you to players, coaches, officials, parents of juniors, and willing helpers who have contributed to table tennis in the ACT throughout 2022. Here's to another successful year in 2023.

TABLE TENNIS NEW SOUTH WALES REPORT



We began 2022 with the remanence of the COVID-19 Virus still hanging around.

We commenced our calendar for 2022 with GPS Schools and TTA High Performance training and Veterans Challenge all under way.

Table Tennis Australia combined Open, Junior Youth and Para Championships to one event to be held at Caloundra in July and the Australian Veterans were re-scheduled for Darwin in October. Teams for the July Championship were selected in early April.

Finally the COVID-19 virus was in “living with COVID mode”. The requirement to attend all Nationals Championships – for all – players, coaches, officials and parents were required to be fully vaccinated – 1 dose U10's, 2 doses 15 & under – 16 to 64 - 2 doses plus a booster and O65 required 2 doses & 2 boosters – with proof of vaccination status required to be submitted. These requirements were required for both the Australian Veterans Championship in Darwin and National Championships in Caloundra – NSW achieved excellent results in teams matches as well as individual events many gold medals.

Our return to sport was identified by the National Authorities and was in line with the Federal Government template.

I would like to thank our Tournament Committee and all our members for assisting with the continued use of the updated procedures and hygiene protocols to continue playing our game at the safest possible level.

All Tournament draws were conducted as fully timed draws with singles event only and limited doubles – all events were timed and played to completion to ensure, get in – play – get out. Everyone now is used to the new procedures and everyone was extremely helpful and assisted with a smooth transition, abiding by the social distancing and taking responsibility for their own personal space. Regular cleaning and sanitising of tables and chairs, checking draws and proceeding to their designated tables.

The Veterans Challenge – pennant days were also very smoothly completed with total cooperation from Veterans Committee and their players. The Veterans completed all the Veterans Challenge matches in 2022.

In 2022 table tennis suffered an enormous loss. Ted Davis passed away suddenly in September whilst playing table tennis. Ted & Jan's work contribution in the Office over the past 20 years has been invaluable and the enormity cannot be expressed in words, a great personal loss to myself. We will continue to promote all projects and programs Ted had in place and ensure his legacy continues.

In moving forward Table Tennis NSW all of Sport Strategic Plan (NSW version) has been working well and due to the success of the grant applications we are able to continue with the initiatives in the social media area and across all digital platforms. The new sub-committees are all working well across all platforms: website, Instagram, Facebook & You Tube. The social media team were in action at tournaments with many cameras and conducting several interviews using the media area. The Media team have been releasing photos and of-interest articles on a regular basis across several platforms. A big Thank you to Slawek, Dylan, Anthony & David. This is an exciting time as the younger members have taken to these new roles and are working closely with Karen Zhang (a former NSW Junior based in Sydney) who is on the Table Tennis Australia Board.

For 2023 we will be continuing the use of timed draws and using two days for tournament events held at Sports Halls Sydney Olympic Park, as well as continuation of the safety protocols. This also includes only online entry and all payments online, to enter you must be a registered member and must pay online and on game day register your attendance. All draws etc will only be available online, in moving to a fully automated system.

Most of our committee meetings have been via Zoom. We have our 2023 AGM in March and have it tentatively booked as a face-to-face meeting. Attendance will also be available via Zoom.

The Sports House renovations are still to be completed; these were schedule for September but will not start until sometime in 2023.

Some of the changes are now permanent and will continue as improvements. Some of the items we have been trying to secure over the past couple of years are now automatic – i.e. more bins, more floor cleaning, hopefully these will be maintained as usual practice. Only the tournaments bookings for 2023 remain as two-day events.

I would also like to thank our valuable major sponsors who have come to our rescue in our time of need by securing: Grants – NSW Office of Sport NSW and Table Tennis World proving essential equipment necessary to continue safely in our sport, immediately on request. We also secured a new sponsor in 2022 – ACY Securities as our Junior Sponsor – on a 2-year agreement. A special thanks to Ted Davis & Michael Li for securing the ACY Securities sponsorship.

TABLE TENNIS NORTHERN TERRITORY REPORT



2022 was a mixed year for TTNT. On the one hand, we successfully hosted the Australian Veteran's Championships and the WTT Youth Contender Darwin events, after 2 years of cancellations due to COVID-19, and on the other a lack of committee members at both the Alice Springs and Darwin clubs hampered club progress and achievement of participation targets.

PARTICIPATION

Darwin hosted the 2022 WTT Youth Contender Darwin event in September/October, together with an international Youth Training Camp. In addition, an International Umpires training course and exams were held resulting in 4 Australian umpires upgrading their qualifications. Player numbers were constrained by slower recovery from COVID-19 in some Asian countries but over 80 players participated from Chinese Taipei, Singapore, Australia, India, Sri Lanka, USA and NZ. Medals were shared between Chinese Taipei, Singapore, Australia and India, with the Australian juniors demonstrating significant improvement in international competitiveness. Two local Darwin <13 juniors participated with Runshu Li reaching the quarter finals in a very strong <13 girls singles field. TTNT is contracted to run the event again in 2023 and 2024 and expects entries to increase to around 100 as international travel opens further.

The Australian Veterans Championships were held in Darwin in mid-October, following cancellations in both 2020 and 2021. Although numbers were a little lower due to a reluctance to travel because of high travel costs and lingering COVID-19 anxiety, the TTA managed event proceeded with few hitches, general acclamation and a successful presentation dinner adjacent to the Fannie Bay beach. Thank you to the TTNT and Darwin TTA volunteers who provided invaluable assistance at both events. Darwin has seen steady growth in morning seniors' activity and anticipate continued activity in 2023.

GOVERNANCE

TTNT level governance was strong, with NT benchmarks very largely achieved, and with diversity of revenue increasing. TTNT has received strong financial support from the NT Government to assist with ongoing programs and in particular the two major events held this year.

Commitment to the TTA /TTNT MUO has enabled further alignment to national strategies and additional financial support.

However, there was a shortfall in volunteers at the club administration level which held back club development and achievement of participation targets. A full resurrection of the Alice Springs Club is a priority for 2023, as is recruiting Darwin committee members to help the President with club administration and development. Performance

TTNT continued with the High-Performance squad, a big thank you to Jonathan Tong, who stepped into the breach left by TY Lee's illness and David Wang's return to China in 2022 and conducted training for the NT Junior Squad. Both Runshu Li and Sebastian Lai continued to develop, with both featuring in a Darwin A grade finals win and Runshu again securing a spot in the National Development Squad. Record achievements were made at the National Veterans Championships. The NT >80 men's team of TT Lee and Joe Abrantes did themselves proud winning gold in the men's teams plus two individual Bronze and one silver medal. Elfrida Kalich excelled in winning gold in the >70 Women's Singles and collecting another three individual silver medals as well.

PROFILE

Both the WTT Youth contender and National Veterans contributed to raising the profile of table tennis in the NT, achieving local TV coverage and the Youth Contender event receiving around 25,000 views/day for the live YouTube coverage.

TTNT has supported DTTA in several "be inclusive" community fun events run by "clubhouse territory" providing networking and profile opportunities to the greater community.

In terms of our state events, all our state championships were successfully held. This included the following events: Queensland Junior Championships (Brisbane), Queensland Closed Championships (Gold Coast), Queensland Open Championships (Townsville) & Queensland Veterans Championships (Mackay). Thank you for these associations that assisted to host to state championships.

For the first time since COVID-19, obviously we were able to send Queensland teams to the respective National Championships.

To assist our Queensland teams in the lead-up to the Nationals, TTQ held various preparation training camps. These included: Queensland Senior, Youth, Junior & Para team camps held in Townsville, Bundaberg & Wynnum & Queensland Veterans team camps held in Mackay & the Gold Coast.

A number of our QLD members achieved outstanding results at the National Championships. This included Ella Yu winning the Under 13 Girls singles championships. On the back of this fantastic result Ella was also recognised as a finalist for the Queensland Junior Sport Star of the Year award at the Queensland Sport Awards. On the Para front Joel Coughlan & Andrea McDonnell combined to win the Class 6-10 teams' event at the Nationals. While our Over 30 Women (Andrea Nicholson, Pippa-Louise Trass, Emma Widdup & Jan Yu), Over 50 Men (David Lu, Mark Mulley, Rodney Perry & Jerrod Thomson) & Over 60 Women (Gayle D'Arcy, Andrea McDonnell, Linda Yap & Helen Zhang) all won gold at the National Veterans team events.

A number of Queensland Volunteers were also recognised at the Table Tennis Australia Volunteer Awards. This included Frank Chen (Young Official of the Year), Mick Coughlan (25 Years of Service) & Agnes Herbertson (50 Years of Service). TABLE TENNIS

SOUTH AUSTRALIA REPORT



As we (TTSA) reflect on 2022, and our expectations at the start of that year, there was a degree of uncertainty as to what the ongoing 'lag' impact of COVID would have on our sport. It is pleasing to report, that these uncertainties were largely unfounded however did leave us with some residual impacts that needed to be mitigated.

In 2022, we also recognised that there was an opportunity to consider the feasibility of a new sporting venue in collaboration with a number of sports and our industry body. There was a lot of energy put into the feasibility part of the project however it did not crystallise - nevertheless it was an appropriate due diligence with lessons learnt. TTSA will go back and consider options and next steps for 2023.

In addition, we recognised that there was a slow 'bounce back' to tournament play across all groups - juniors, seniors and veterans which saw participation numbers at a lower level than pre-COVID – TTSA will be planning to rectify this in 2023.

Despite these challenges, the sport in SA has re-engaged with key stakeholders as we emerge from COVID, including government agencies, schools and our coaching communities.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCY

- Spent a material amount of time updating and revitalising the new website including new modules that had been added on from the prior year.
- Continued with the ongoing frameworks to manage winter pennant including data entry and team results – this will continue into 2023.
- Implemented a practical user guide/manual (specific for TT) for Star Club accreditation that was rolled out to all clubs/affiliates to walk them through accreditation.
- Maintained regular Board meetings to ensure the continuity of decision making and momentum.

RECOGNITION AND FINANCIAL SECURITY

- Continued to focus on building the social membership levels and advocate with clubs on the benefits.
- Continued to manage/oversee member disputes at the local level.
- Successfully collaborated with TTA to achieve funding for our TTSA High Performance (Able and Para) Programs – we will be focussing on re-affirming our athlete pathways in Q1 of 2023
- Successfully received a grant for Leadership and Policy for an extended period of time.

ON COURT

- Conducted the Junior, Para, Youth, Senior and Veterans State Titles to crown State Champions.
- Hosted the 2022 Country Carnival Tournament.
- Maintained our Social Media presence.
- Outsourced the running of the Smash Hits program which continues to build year on year.
- Re-established regular TTSA squads (High Performance, Development and Emerging Athletes and Para programs).
- Supported individual clubs with grant applications.
- Supported and advocated for TTA (National Federation) programs such as Spinneroos, and Sporting Schools.

IMPROVEMENT FOCUS

- Held the Winter Pennant Competition with a growth in numbers.
- Hosted the Super Saturday Finals.

- Held member feedback sessions in relation to tournaments formats, Smash Hits and Schools programs.

HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

TTSA has been running high performance programs and associated pathways under Paul Langley (OLY) since his return to SA in 2006. The results over these years have been positive and are a testament to the talent within the state. In 2022, Paul stepped away from leading the program and handed the reins over to the well credentialed and experienced Kay Crowell.

As a result of a successful grant application in late 2022, TTSA is committed to re-invigorating the high performance programs with Kay and designing a framework that will provide more opportunities for talented players within the state to reach their full potential and compete at a higher level. This is a key priority for Q1 2023.

The High Performance Program will provide players with access to professional coaching and training, as well as support to compete in national and international tournaments. The program will work closely with local clubs, members and country affiliates to provide players with the opportunity to develop their skills and to reach their goals.

LOOKING FORWARD TO 2023

2023 is expected to be a year of growth and development for Table Tennis. We will continue to promote the sport, grow participation and engage with our community and will continue to seek out new opportunities for the sport and look for ways to make the sport more accessible and enjoyable for people of all levels.

Consistent with prior years, we do appreciate that not everyone will agree with the decisions that the TTSA Board of Management makes, however, you can be guaranteed that appropriate due diligence and care has been taken prior to any decision being made that impacts on a member, members, clubs/affiliates or the TT community in general.

TABLE TENNIS TASMANIA REPORT

A STORY

When newspaper reporter, Sidney Fields, wanted to run a story about a young man who had become a phenomenon in the United States of America, he went and visited the young man's home. When the parents showed the reporter their only son's room, there was a large collection of all manner of stuffed toys. The father, Vernon, said, "I took him to carnivals and taught him how to pitch baseballs at wooden bottles to win stuffed animals." His parents went on to say that *"their son always listened to them."* (a lesson for us all – if you are not teachable, your future is already determined)

Players have been upskilled as TOPS coaches, State Umpires and Level 1 Coach.

These development activities contribute to helping us strive toward the goal of Sport Australia's bold vision of "ensuring Australia is the world's most active and healthy nation, known for our integrity and sporting success".

We are also grateful for the ongoing financial contribution from TTA as per the Memorandum of Understanding between TTT and TTA, and the ongoing support we receive from all at TTA.

FINANCIALS

TTT actively strives to ensure our sport does not discourage participation due to excessive costs while maintaining its viability to continue operating as a successful sporting organisation. We will therefore continue to keep our costs low and our enthusiasm high.

GROWTH STRATEGY

The influx of young players is vital if our table tennis community is to continue to grow and thrive. The opportunities available to introduce table tennis in our school system is one we embrace and will seek to capitalise on for 2023 and our future activities.

These are the backbone of our organisation and our clubs. TTT acknowledges and honours all those who provide their time, skills, service, enthusiasm and dedication in ensuring that the sport we love, can be enjoyed across Tasmania by all table tennis loving people. Thank you.

TABLE TENNIS VICTORIA REPORT

I am delighted to provide my first CEO report for Table Tennis Victoria.

Since commencing in February 2022 it has been wonderful to visit so many affiliates and tournaments, and meet so many of our TTV members. I would like to sincerely thank everyone for the warm welcome to the sport and all of the advice and support during the year.

2022 was a year of getting back to playing table tennis and having a full year of competition after two years that were affected by COVID-19. It was also the final year of our 2019-2022 'Our Future Now!' Strategic Plan and saw us able to focus on the key strategic objectives around Participation, Profile and Performance.

PARTICIPATION

Thanks to the great work of our affiliates in re-engaging their members post-COVID we were able to record membership numbers in 2022 which were on par with membership numbers in 2019.

Participation initiatives that the TTV office focused on during the year included:

- Encouraging affiliates to run the Spinneroos junior table tennis program with a subsidy to assist in paying coaches;
- Running the inaugural TTV School Sport Victoria Primary Schools Cup across metro and regional districts culminating in a Primary Schools Cup Final at MSAC in October;
- Establishing two new para programs at Croydon & Districts Table Tennis Association and Coburg Table Tennis Club;
- Piloting a quick-form Ping Pong Rush social competition and developing marketing assets for affiliates;
- Continuing to deliver Enhancement Project in Clubs (EPIC) workshops across Victoria to assist affiliates to better understand governance and policy requirements; and,

- Delivering many come and try pop-up events.

PROFILE

Developing the profile of table tennis is something I am particularly focused on and there were several initiatives that took place in 2022 and will be built out further in 2023.

- Logos were developed for some of our key Table Tennis Victoria programs including the State Tournament Circuit, the Victorian State Team, TTV Premier League and Ping Pong Rush;
- A Workplace Partnership corporate offering was developed to promote the benefits of table tennis in engaging staff and promoting wellbeing at the office;
- Our social media channels received record engagement during the Junior/Senior/Para Australian Championships thanks to daily coverage of results;
- Victorians received award recognition with Alois Rosario named Vicsport Coach of the Year and Disability Sport and Recreation Coach of the Year and the Victorian Para team named the Disability Sport and Recreation Team of the Year; and,
- The 2022 Corporate Cup was run in November, sponsored by NWR Communications, with 13 teams competing at MSAC to be crowned champion.

PERFORMANCE

Victoria continued to excel in the area of performance with incredible results recorded at state, national and international levels.

STATE TOURNAMENTS

- It was excellent to have a full calendar year of competitions including State Tournament Circuit events, Victorian Open Championships, Victorian Closed Championships, Country Championships and Metro Championships.

AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

- Para squad members won 25 medals including 11 gold, 10 silver and 4 bronze.
- Senior & Youth squad members won 19 medals including 7 gold, 7 silver and 5 bronze.
- Junior squad members won 45 medals including 18 gold, 16 silver and 11 bronze.
- Best Player Awards went to Nicholas Lum (Men's, Under 21 & 17), Jake Ballestrino (Para Class 6-10 category), Finn Luu (Under 19), Connie Psihogios (Under 17 & 15) and Alice Xia (Under 11). Nicholas Lum was also awarded Michael Szabados Award for the Australian Junior Player of the Year.
