ANNUAL REPORT OF HONORARY GENERAL SECRETARY

FOR PERIOD 1st AUGUST, 1978 TO 30th JUNE, 1979

COUNCIL DECISIONS: At the 1978 Annual General Meeting in Melbourne in September, the following decisions were taken:

- (i) Percentages of Australian Championships ball adoption fee were changed to : A.T.T.A. 50%, Nationals Home-state 30%, Subjunior Home-state 20%.
- (ii) Secrecy of nominations for office was ended.
- (iii) Time allowed for objections to composition of team-squads was extended from three to seven days.
- (iv) The "State of the Year" Award was abolished and the Trudek Award given to Victoria in perpetuity.
- (v) It was decided that Australia and New Zealand should alternate in nominating for the positions of I.T.T.F. Vice President and Council, with Australia having first nomination for Vice President and New Zealand for Councillor.
- (vi) Medallions for Australian Championship events were changed to gold (first), silver (second) and bronze (losing semi finalists.)
- (vii) A two year contract was made with the National Director Coaching, Mr. Eric Coster.
- (viii) An agreement was made with International Table Tennis Pty. Ltd. for conduct of an international tournament in 1979, with an option for extension to 1980.
- (ix) The subsidy for visiting umpires invited to officiate at the Australian Championships was increased to \$50.
- (x) The following makes of balls were approved for play in Australia : Nittaki Nxxx white and colour, Nxx white; Halex 3 star white and yellow; TSP Astoll white and yellow; Barna 3 crown white; Slazenger Panther white and yellow.
- (xi) Office-bearers other than State delegates will in future have no vote on election of office-bearers, constitutional matters or those affecting State finances.

OTHER HAPPENINGS:

Grants obtained from the Federal Department of Home Affairs were: National Director of Coaching \$20,000, Coaching \$2,500, Overseas tour \$11,500, international meetings overseas \$1000.

A group of Chinese Coaches toured Australia in September - October 1978, as part of a Cultural Exchange for which a Foreign Affairs Department grant of \$11,000 was obtained. A booklet of notes on the Coaches' methods was published by the A.T.T.A.

The 1978 Australian Championships took place in Melbourne, with New Zealand by invitation sending junior boys and girls teams for the first time.

A National Coaching Seminar was held in Adelaide in May 1979.

National Selectors appointed May 1, 1979 were : Dr. W. Savige (Vic), Mr. R. Hodge (SA) and Mr. N. Harwood (Tas) chairman.

Miss N. Callinan (N.S.W. Delegate) did not seek re-election in March 1979 and was replaced by Mr. D. Galvin.

The A.T.T.A.'s Regulations were revised and re-issued in August 1978.

No Ansett Airlines of Australia Tournament of Champions was held during the period of report, the tournament intended for July 1979 in Queensland having been cancelled and later played in Melbourne in October.

A Special Personal Meeting was held in Melbourne on February 3/4, 1979. Priorities for application for Federal funding were set as follows:

- (i) National Executive Director coupled with application for administration assistance including same for promotion.

- (ii) Visits by overseas coaches.
- (iii) Overseas tournaments.
- (iv) National Junior Training Camp.
- (v) Visits by overseas teams (including Hong Kong).

At the September 1979 General Personal Meeting the matter of appointment of a National Executive Director was deferred pending redrafting of the Constitution.

AUSTRALIAN TEAMS CHAMPIONSHIPS 1978.

The 33rd National Championships were conducted by the Victorian Table Tennis Association from September 16th - 22nd at the Table Tennis Centre of Victoria, Melbourne.

The event was significant as New Zealand were represented for the first time at a National Championships by junior boys and girls teams. Also the format of play was altered so that all team events were concluded before the individual events commenced.

REPORT BY HON. INTERNATIONAL SECRETARY FOR YEAR 1978/79.

The past twelve months has seen unprecedented activity in respect of participation in overseas Championships by Australia's Table Tennis teams.

Both our men and women's teams competed in four overseas Championships, with the following results:

Both teams improved their World ranking two places and all players who represented Australia in any of these events deserve congratulations as does also Eric Coster, our National Director of Coaching.

Individual titles were won by Paul Pinkewich and Chris Little at the Oceania and by Steve Knapp and Robbie Javor in the Commonwealth Men's Doubles.

Kerry Thompson's win over China's Chang Li in the Asian Teams event received wide media coverage, and was the first victory by an Australia over a Chinese player in an Open Championship.

Neil Ward also distinguished himself by reaching the final of the Consolation Singles at the Worlds - this is the fourth occasion on which Australia has been runner-up in the Consolation events.

The total cost of these tours was of the order of \$35,000, of which \$17,000 was contributed by the Commonwealth Government, and approximately one-quarter by the A.T.T.A. and by the players and officials selected.

Once again, tours to Australia by overseas countries proved difficult to arrange. Following the cancellation of the visit by the Hungarian team in 1977, much time and preparation went into organising a visit by the Hong Kong Men's team in 1978, but this was cancelled following a change in the date of the Asian Championships. This year a visit has been arranged by India's National Teams for October 1979, and details are currently being finalised.

Our leading players have indicated in an open letter that they want training camps and more international play to maintain their world rankings. Although I am certain that the A.T.T.A. Council would agree that we desire our players to have every opportunity, it must be pointed out that these projects cost a lot of money and it is not easy to raise.

Perhaps moves currently under way to run a National Sports Lottery will result in more money being available to our sport, but I cannot see sufficient funds ever being available to employ our top players permanently.

At each of the Championships listed earlier, I had the honour of being one of Australia's delegates. I do feel that it is important for the A.T.T.A. to be represented on as many Committees of the various Federations as possible, and record the following current appointments:

Additionally the I.T.T.F. Congress approved a proposition that the Executive Committee of 4 be enlarged by making the co-option of a Vice President of a Continent directly concerned with the matters under consideration compulsory instead of optional as at present.

Under the new scheme for election of the I.T.T.F. Council, each zone is represented according to the number of Associations in its zone which are affiliated with the I.T.T.F. Oceania is entitled to one such Council member, and we have agreed with New Zealand that we will alternate the positions of Vice President and Council member. New Zealand T.T.A. nominated their Chairman, Alf Harding, as their Council Member until the next World Championships, and also as a Commonwealth Championship Committee member. Mr. Harding was duly elected to both positions.

At the I.T.T.F. Congress, the President, Mr. Roy Evans, referred to the benefits already gained by many Associations following the recognition of table tennis as an Olympic sport by the I.O.C., but could not give any indication of the possible inclusion of table tennis in future Olympic Games. The Commonwealth Games to be held in Brisbane in 1981 has included table tennis as an exhibition sport, and Mr. Bond has already taken steps to ensure that this exhibition will bring credit to the Australian Table Tennis Association.

The Minutes of the first session of the I.T.T.F. Congress detail on Page 2, item 9, the official view concerning a statement signed by 19 Associations protesting about the exclusion of South Korea and Israel from the 35th World Championships. Following a telephone call from our President, Mr. L. Hitchen, who advised that our Foreign Affairs Department would be happy if we were not represented, I signed the statement on behalf of Australia. The statement was not put to the vote but would have been defeated about 50/30, but strong feelings remain amongst the Western democracies on this issue, and already Yugoslavia has promised that visas will be issued to all I.T.T.F. members for the next Championships to be held in Novi Sad.

The decision by the North Koreans to alter the date of the charter flight from Singapore on which we were booked was conveyed to us by cable whilst we were en route to Edinburgh and caused considerable difficulty and extra expense. The North Koreans were unsympathetic to our request for assistance with the one day extra hotel bill which we incurred in Pyongyang because of the change, claiming that the charter flight saved us a considerable amount. In our case, this was not so.

Our teams were well equipped by Adidas, and the behaviour of the players, both on and off the court, was the best of any of the tours with which I have been associated.

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 1979

After a surplus of \$3322 last year, it is disturbing to report a deficit of \$4666 resulting in negative accumulation funds of \$674.

This has been primarily caused by subsidies totalling \$7585 of Australian representatives at four overseas Championships, and a loss of \$2369 on the tour of Chinese Coaches during the year.

The current year will need to be one of financial prudence in order to re-establish ourselves as a viable entity, and to prepare us for what could be a most active and dynamic decade of Australian table tennis.

A.T.T.A. UMPIRES' COMMITTEE

This current season has been somewhat encouraging after so many years of a plodding nature.

This was brought about by Seminars conducted in Western Australia, Queensland and South Australia when visited by Ron Chadband. It would seem that such an event engendered considerable interest and recruitment followed, as will be evident by the following reports.

TASMANIA: Tasmania has had a quiet, but effective, year as regards umpiring. All major tournaments are now in the charge of qualified referees (State Umpire level) and the finals of all Open events are umpired by qualified personnel, with the workload well shares. In fact, at the Tasmanian Open Championships, Bill Atkinson was requested by the referee to prepare a list of finals umpires and found that he had more than the ten they needed - a new occurrence in Tasmania.

Having caught up on a backlog of suitable candidates in the past few years, no new ones came forward this year. They do not regard this as serious in the short-term, but hope to recruit two or three next year.

Two former Probationary Certificate holders have been granted full State Umpire status recently.

Mr. Philip Males is sitting for the National examination in Adelaide. Phill travelled to Melbourne last year to gain experience for this occasion.

Tasmania's first television tournament in many years was staffed by umpires from their panel.

Dress regulations are still a bone of contention in Tasmania. The wearing of tracksuits has been overdone in theory, but is sometimes essential due to the very cold mornings experienced at some tournaments. The main worry is the illegality of most major brands of tracksuits. Many local viewers have reported the same kind of occurrence in watching the Wills International on television where seemingly illegal shirts are worn. These sorts of things cause worry to their umpires and referees. The old problem of jeans is becoming less frequent lately.

Generally, Tasmanian players have a high respect for the umpires and few incidents are occurring.

QUEENSLAND: It has been a year of good support and progress. In February and March, Ron Chadband held Seminars in Brisbane, Rockhampton and Cairns. These Seminars sparked much interest in the umpiring ranks and many good ideas resulted.

There have been four candidates sit for their State badges this year. Queensland is gradually getting all their umpires into uniform, and the uniform is helping the umpires to gain higher respect from the players.

Queensland held the National Sub-Junior and their umpires gained much experience from the tournament.

In summing up, Queensland has strengthened their umpires' association through the pulling together of all practising umpires, and Tom Berndt feels the Seminar early in the year was the break-through.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA : At the 1978 "Australian" in Melbourne, Mr. Buckby stated he would arrange a Seminar in Adelaide but it was not until March that this took place. However, this was a step forward for South Australia and they were pleased when Ron Chadband accepted their invitation to come to Adelaide to conduct the Seminar. Noel Bell was disappointed that so few took advantage of this opportunity to get up to date with the rules, even if they did not intend to sit for the examination. Over the week-end ten people (including two qualified umpires) attended the sessions, although eighteen accepted the invitation to the Seminar.

Noel Bell expressed his thanks to Ron for his excellent work and reported that two, D. Luckraft and G. Bungey, have sat for the examination and passed, with a third failing. Two more have handed in their papers (not marked at time of report) and Noel Bell is expecting two others, and added "perhaps we are at last attracting a little interest in umpiring in South Australia".

Noel Bell has now advised affiliated associations that he is willing to conduct Seminars in their areas, provided they have sufficient numbers to justify his travelling the distance involved.

Perhaps the next twelve months will prove more fruitful than the previous years, even though progress has been made this year.

NEW SOUTH WALES : Report not submitted.

VICTORIA : As usual, slow progress but Victoria has a good nucleus of umpires in their League who are always prepared to accept their responsibilities as referees and umpires for all major tournaments, in addition to country tournaments and two nights each week as Pennant Referees.

Two Probationary Umpires attained State ranking but being domiciled in the country the panel has not had the opportunity to assess their ability.

Mrs. V. Gay, Mrs. P. Price, Dr. R. Augustyn and Mr. R. Neville sat for their National exam in Melbourne during the Australian Championships and were successful. Three new State Probationary Umpires during the year were Miss A. Gay, Mrs. P. Rosario and Mr. J. Bartolo. Those who failed are gaining more experience and will try again.

At the Wills Tournament conducted in Melbourne our best umpires were on duty including Stuart Scott from New South Wales. All agreed that the standard of umpiring was excellent and of course the umpires were glad of the opportunity to officiate at the International vel.

Angelo Tabone, one of our International Umpires, acquitted himself very well at the World Championships from all reports, and we therefore take pride in that.

To sum up, a good year but Victoria still needs more umpires to lighten the load for the work seems endless with Winter and Spring Pennant, five major Melbourne Tournaments and many country competitions.

COACHING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1979 (N. Harwood)

The following is a report on the Coaching Committee for 1979 which has not been a particularly good year in this regard. I started with Bill Oatey and Gary Walmsley on this committee but lost Gary in early May. Bill as usual has given every assistance particularly in the organisation of the Coaching Seminar.

There are several aspects I now wish to deal with.

1. NATIONAL JUNIOR TRAINING CAMP : This event did not occur because I was on long service leave August/November 1978 and was not aware that I was supposed to organise a camp until mid December. I considered holding one in June in conjunction with the Sub Junior Championships but this was not practicable. The incoming committee will have to start preparing for one in January 1980, which I suggest be held in Victoria at Geelong if possible.

2. NATIONAL COACHING SEMINAR : This event was held in Adelaide in May with 2 delegates from each state attending. My committee, with the help of Ansetts, the Federal Government Grant and a South Australian Government Grant were able to provide a free air fare and accommodation for all visiting delegates. Despite this, I had difficulty in getting States to find people to attend and I was very disappointed to find that very few National Diploma Coaches attended. However those people who did attend found the Seminar most informative and I consider it was very successful. I am still waiting for notes from some of the speakers and regardless of my official involvement in coaching next year, I propose to issue notes on the Seminar by mid October.

3. ACCREDITATION OF COACHES: This problem continues to be one of concern. At the National Seminar delegates raised the question of method of accreditation within states and I think the discussions that followed may have helped with consistency of methods in Australia. The new committee will have to look at National Diploma Assessment Panel as I feel that some members at present are not actively involved in the Scheme. There will also be some work to be done to bring us into line with the National Accreditation Scheme.

4. USE OF NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF COACHING: In response to a proposal to the A.T.T.A., I requested all State Coaching Co-Ordinators to comment on the effectiveness of the N.D.C. I have only received replies from Queensland, New South Wales and Tasmania and these States have indicated that this has been of great assistance in organising coaching schemes and developing coaching with those States.

5. NATIONAL REGISTER OF COACHES: I have twice requested State Co-Ordinators to provide me with a list of their accredited coaches but to date only Queensland and Tasmania have responded. As soon as I have the remainder I will establish a National Register. I would appreciate State Delegates' assistance with this project.

6. STRUCTURE OF NATIONAL COACHING COMMITTEE: It is my opinion that the National Director of Coaching (a full time employee of the A.T.T.A.) should be chairman of this committee and that the coaching co-ordinator in each State should be a committee member. That is there should be seven on the committee.

7. CONCLUSION: I am disappointed that I have not been able to submit a report showing better results and to this end I feel that I have not been successful in the position. There have been several factors that have helped cause this position and these are :

- (a) Internal bickering within table tennis in Australia particularly involving the N.C.
- (b) Lack of administration within States in the coaching area - all our people are only part time volunteers.
- (c) My own involvement in the erection of a Table Tennis Centre in Hobart.

The first two problems are difficult to solve and a lot of thought must be given to these and the third is much easier as I do not wish to be re-appointed because I will have my hands full with the organisation of the next National Titles.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF COACHING 1978 (E. Coster)

1978 has been very much a formative year for the National Coaching Scheme.

The re-introduction of Federal Government Grants has given the scheme an element of stability to enable us to plan for the future and the streamlining of the N.D.C. Committee has been most successful, creating, I believe, a very good working relationship.

During 1978 I have visited all States with the exception of Queensland and in every case a great deal of enthusiasm and co-operation has been shown.

State Coaching Award Schemes, directly linked to the National Coaching Award Scheme, have now been established in all States and by the end of the year initial assessments will have been made.

The National Coaching Manual has been prepared and is in the final printing process through the courtesy of B.P. This will give all coaches guidelines to work to and assist the development of the Coaching Awards Scheme.

The Proficiency Awards Scheme is also complete and I am now awaiting confirmation of a sponsor for this.

The various sponsors of the National Coaching Scheme - Adidas, Ansett, B.P., Coco Cola, Rothmans National Sport Foundation and T.S.P.- have assisted me in every way and it is due to them that we are able to implement the scheme fully.

The National Coaching Committee, under their new Chairman, Neil Harwood, have given me every encouragement and support and I feel sure will continue to assist the development of the Coaching Scheme.

If my position with the Association continues, hopefully the Coaching Scheme will advance, and my ideas at present include further printed information for use of coaches, advanced level seminars for our leading coaches and development of table tennis within the school system.

There have been many problems to overcome during the year and the majority of these have been resolved. However, attempts to solve the problems with communication have not been entirely successful and further thought must be given to this.

It was also most disappointing to find that very few of the suggestions in my reports to Council were acknowledged or even discussed at length.

I would like to especially thank the members of the N.D.C. Committee, Mr. Alan Cleaves and Mr. Len Haycraft, for their co-operation, assistance and support during the year.

REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF COACHING 1979

The past 12 months has seen various major events of great importance to the development of the National Coaching Scheme.

1. The publication of the National Coaching Manual - this has been very well received and over 350 copies are now in use.
2. The visit of the party of Coaches from the Peoples Republic of China - this gave a great boost to those who took the opportunity of attending the various lectures. The booklet of notes produced after the tour was also well received and over 250 copies have been sold to date.
3. The introduction of the Acton Proficiency Awards Scheme - this is proving a great help to both players and coaches. The scheme is designed to encourage players to practice systematically.
4. The second National Coaching Seminar held in Adelaide - attended by delegates from all States. This was very successful.
5. The publication of the syllabus for the National Coaching Awards - this will clarify many points relating to the awards and enable States to run their own courses and seminars.

6. The production for the first time of films at the World Championships. These will enable coaches to study the advanced techniques of the International players.
7. The announcement of the State and Federal Government National Coaching Accreditation Schemes - this will further upgrade our coaching standards and our own coaching scheme is designed to work in conjunction with this scheme.

During the year I have visited all States and the Northern Territory to conduct Seminars and carry out promotions in schools. A disappointing factor has been the low numbers attending seminars, especially in the larger States.

Assessments of coaches have now been made in all States and each State now has its own qualified coaches capable of running seminars for lower level coaches. This is essential for the future development of the coaching scheme.

The various sponsors of the National Coaching Scheme - Acton, Adidas, B.P., and the Rothmans National Sport Foundation - have given me every assistance and support during the year.

The National Coaching Committee, Neil Harwood, Bill Oatey and Gary Walmsley, have also given me every encouragement and support.

There is still much to do to develop the scheme, one of the major items being a visual aids package - Charts, video tapes etc. - to assist coaches specially in the country areas.

Much more of the coaching of lower level coaches needs to be carried out by the State Coaching Personnel and a streamlining of their coaching administration structure can assist this.

There are still problems to overcome in terms of communication, especially amongst coaching personnel.

REPORT FROM VICTORIA.

AFFILIATIONS: At the end of September, 1978, 69 associations were affiliated with the V.T.T.A., representing, with V.T.T.A. pennant, an estimated 10,196 players (not including junior, sub-junior or inter-school pennants).

At August 1, 1979, 58 associations are affiliated, representing with V.T.T.A. pennant, 8,472 players.

Affiliations in so far including one new association (Edenhope) and one returned after absence (Rupanyup). Thirteen associations affiliated last year have not yet renewed. Northern Association (191 teams) is in recess as the V.T.T.A. decided to conduct a Summer pennant in the time usually occupied by Northern. This summer pennant includes the same teams which played in Northern T.T.A., so the loss of 191 teams is only a paper figure; in estimating registered players the V.T.T.A. in the past has counted only its winter pennant and the principal season of each affiliate. Eastern Industries T.T.A. has amalgamated with Eastern Suburban Churches to form the Eastern Suburban and Churches T.T.A., a move which should enable more clubs to join.

NEW CENTRES: Hamilton opened a new centre last October. Croydon & District T.T.A. has signed a 20 year lease for a new stadium at Kilsyth, and Ballarat will open a 26 table stadium on August 12.

ANNUAL MEETING: Features of the annual general meeting in March were the defeat of the retiring secretary, Mr. John Strantzen, by Mrs. Val Walsh, and the constitutional change to give affiliated associations one vote per registered team, the same as for V.T.T.A. pennant clubs.

TOURNAMENTS: Open tournaments, particularly in the country, are booming this year, with record entries in most cases.

This appears to be due to the institution of a Grand Prix scheme awarding points on a graduated scale for success in open and junior singles events, with substantial cash prizes (trophies for juniors) for the players leading in aggregate points at the end of the tournament season.

STEVE KNAPP : Not long after his return from the World and Commonwealth Championships, Steve Knapp, last year's leading man player, announced his retirement at the age of 25.

COACHING : The Victorian Table Tennis Coaches Association now has over 60 members. Most of them however, are only part time coaches, so there is still a lack of personnel available for coaching in schools.

The subcommittee appointed to seek a State Director of Coaching has decided to make no recommendation from the applications received for a full time appointee.

The National Director of Coaching was in Victoria during the period of the State Championships when he visited a number of country associations, mainly as a refresher for the coaching they received from him in 1978.

WILLS: The Wills International Tournament was conducted at the Leisure Centre, Croydon an outer suburb of Melbourne, from June 24 - 26.

Organisation was smooth, play was good, a fine television series resulted but patrons were disappointingly moderate in number.

Earlier arrangement of dates, to avoid clashes with local and State pennant, and consideration of a more central venue would be necessary if this event is to be repeated in Victoria.

The A.B.C. has shown the Wills Tournament on Wednesdays, the V.T.T.A. main pennant night, so not many top players would have seen it.

SAMBOY TOURNAMENT: Less than one hundred entries were received throughout the State for the "Samboy" National Under 15 Championship.

Main reason seems to be that many top sub-junior players of known calibre were again eligible and State finalists could be easily predicted.

State and National finals at Doncaster Shoppingtown were conducted smoothly.

Billeting and volunteer transport for interstate competitors in the National finals proved unobtainable, so private hotel accommodation and a bus were arranged by the V.T.T.A. for teams and managers.

LOSS OF WOMEN PLAYERS: In this year's Country Championships there was a drop from 35 women's teams to 25, and many country associations report a loss of women players.

The same situation seems to have developed in V.T.T.A. pennant, which is mixed. Efforts will be made next winter to re-establish a women's pennant.

Opinions as to why we are losing women from the game vary, but suggestions are :

1. other games attracting women are available in new multi-sports centres
2. sloppiness of table tennis attire compared with fashionable "frillies" worn by women in other sports
