# BOARD AND CEO'S REPORT



Australian table tennis has overcome the challenges of the last 6 years and has emerged stronger than ever: in membership numbers; participation; international performance in both para and AB; and strengthened governance and financial performance.

To survive and thrive as a sport in Australia we must face up to new challenges: increasing competition in our efforts to engage with the younger generation; intense competition for available government grant assistance; the need to be more professional in our pitches for much needed commercial sponsorship; the imperative to significantly raise the profile of our sport; and the imperative to adapt our membership model and program offerings to meet the circumstances and preferences of new generations.

Table Tennis Australia looks forward to tackling these challenges in partnership with State/Territory Associations and Clubs.

Some of the highlights from 2023 include:

## HIGH PERFORMANCE AND PATHWAYS:

- Our best ever World Youth Championships results from 2022 were almost repeated. The Australian Team returned from Slovenia with 1 Bronze medal and 2 quarter-finals.
- The ITTF-Oceania Championships, which were held in Townsville, were dominated once again by Australia. We won 24 of 28 possible Gold medals and 7 of 8 World Championship qualifications. Aditya Sareen became the youngest winner of the Men's Singles in history at 15 years of age.
- The ITTF-Oceania Para Regional Championships, which were held in Honiara, Solomon Islands, and which was the qualifying event for the 2024 Paralympic Games was also dominated by Australia. The AUS Para Team won 9 x Gold, 6 x Silver and 6 x Bronze medals.
- At the Oceania Olympic Team and Mixed Doubles Qualification Tournament Australia won the maximum athlete quota for Paris 2024, 3 male and 3 female athletes.
- Australian Para athletes competed in 10 x International Para events and won a total of 26 x Gold, 3 x Silver and 9 x Bronze medals across all events.
- Australian athletes competed in a record 33 international events throughout the year, winning a record 125 medals.
- 7 Australian athletes finished the year in the top 100 world rankings (senior), the most ever, including Yangzi Liu (WR27 in Women's) and Nicholas Lum (WR34 in Men's) improving their previous career-best rankings.
- 5 Australian athletes finished the year in the top 10 world rankings (Para), including Qian Yang who once again finished 2023 ranked as number 1 in the world (Class 10 Women's).
- During the year, Aditya Sareen became the first ever Australian to reach number 1 in the world rankings in able-bodied Under 15 Boys Singles.
- National Squad training continued to go from strength to strength, with record training hours continuing to be offered in Melbourne and Sydney.
- Hopes Programs and Talent ID initiatives were held in 6 States/Territories, attracting more than 230 participants and serving as an important vehicle in providing opportunities for all parts of the high-performance pathway.
- The Para Pathways Program continued to support 12 centres in 7 States/Territories, delivering 150 new participants; The National Para Pathway Camp was once again conducted at the National Para Training Centre in Melbourne in August with 14 x talent identified athletes invited to attend.

- 11 x new para-athletes were classified, and 55 x entries were received ahead of the 2023 National Championships. The provisional classification process continued to be successfully rolled out across all States/Territories.

## PARTICIPATION AND DEVELOPMENT:

- The TTA Equipment and Facilities Grant Program was successfully rolled out for a sixth consecutive year. 16 clubs/associations from 7 States/Territories received grants, which resulted in more than \$101,000 worth of equipment and facilities being injected into the table tennis community, including Port Sorell Table Tennis Club. Cumulatively across the six years of the program to date, more than \$540,000 worth of equipment and facilities have been distributed to 85 clubs/associations across all 8 States/Territories.
- 17 outstanding contributors to the sport were honoured through the National Volunteer and Coaches Awards Program. Hot Shot Table Tennis Club (WA) was named Club/Association of the Year.

- Player of the Year awards went to: Yangzi Liu (NSW) (Senior – Victor Barna Memorial Trophy), Qian Yang (VIC) (Para – Arthur Wilks Award), Aditya Sareen (VIC) (Junior – Michael Szabados Award), and Julie Coombes (SA) (Veterans – Ken Cole Trophy).

Marie Pinkewich (NSW) had the honour of being awarded the Bev and Brian James Trophy as the 2023 National Volunteer of the Year.

- Membership rebounded strongly to exceed pre-COVID-19 numbers with 11,478 members being recorded through 2023.
- Our entry level program, Spinnerroos, continued to be rolled out at both club and school level throughout Australia.
- Our Sporting Schools program continued to be rolled out across Australia, with more than 22,000 students undertaking the program.

## NATIONAL EVENTS:

- 2023 saw 8 highly successful national events delivered across 6 States/Territories.
- The National Senior, Youth, Junior and Para Championships were combined into one all-inclusive event once again. The event attracted 500 competitors and 2,056 individual event entries from all States/Territories.
- The National Veterans Championships was played and attracted 419 competitors and 1,837 individual event entries from all States/Territories and New Zealand.
- After a pilot event in 2021, the TTA Tour was expanded to cover 4 events in 2023 (Geelong, Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane).

Overall, the event series was a roaring success, attracting 629 competitors and more than 1,304 individual event entries from 7 States/Territories plus New Zealand, Fiji and Pakistan.

- The National Hopes Week & Challenge attracted 74 entries from 7 States/Territories and continues to set the benchmark in terms of sourcing the next generation of players.
- 7 national events were livestreamed with outstanding statistics being generated. 91,000 unique viewers and 118,000 total views watched 318,000 minutes (5,300 hours) of footage in more than 30 countries. Social media posts (Facebook) reached 482,000 people across more than 206 posts. Finally, 560,000 website hits were achieved.

## GOVERNANCE AND FINANCE:

- The 2023-2025 TTA Strategic Plan is currently being implemented. TTA is working with all States/Territories to ensure that State/Territory Strategic Plans align with TTA's whilst maintaining a localised focus where beneficial. This will ensure that a unified strategic direction is in place, and we are working together to achieve the strategic objectives nationally.
- The Strategic Plan will be reviewed in early 2024 to ensure that it remains relevant, meeting the needs of the business and broader ecosystem.

- A sixth consecutive surplus was delivered and the TTA Cash Reserves Target was met in 2023.
- Importantly, with the TTA Cash Reserves target being met, it is anticipated that the need to generate surplus results will diminish, meaning more resources can be put into further developing the sport.

## RECOGNITION:

Scott Houston completed his term as TTA CEO at the end of May 2023. Scott started as acting CEO in mid 2017, having resigned his board position to take on the role following the resignation of the previous CEO, and was appointed to the position in early 2018. Scott played a key role in TTA's recovery from a \$650,000 "black hole" in 2017, significant inherited governance deficits and the challenges of COVID-19. We express our deep appreciation for Scott's contribution to Australian table tennis and wish him the best in his future endeavours.

John Murphy also left the role of Head Coach AB in the first half of 2023, having filled the role for over 4 and a half years. John played a significant role in Australia's improved AB performance at the international level, including the Tokyo Olympics and Birmingham Commonwealth Games, and particularly in Australia's growing international strength at the junior level.

Four players made their international debut (Able-Bodied) and were recognised as Official Australian Representatives. Congratulations to Aditya Sareen, Connie Psihogios, Danni-Elle Townsend and Lennard Properjohn. The Official Australian Representative tallies now sit at 79 (Able-Bodied Men), 72 (Able-Bodied Women), 74 (Para Men) and 31 (Para Women).

An icon of Australian veterans table tennis was inducted into the TTA Hall of Fame: Buddy Reid (Veterans). Congratulations Buddy, you are indeed a most worthy inductee.

Sincere thanks go to all funding partners and peak bodies, namely the Australian Sports Commission and the AIS, Commonwealth Games Australia, Australian Olympic Committee, Paralympics Australia, ITTF and ITTF-Oceania. TTA enjoys a positive working relationship with all parties and looks forward to this continuing in 2024 and beyond.

Thank you also to all TTA's commercial partners. In particular our long-term partners Nittaku and DHS, Table Tennis World through the backing of Paul Pinkewich, plus all others who supported TTA throughout the year.

Thanks is also extended to the State/Territory Associations for working collaboratively to improve our sport for all. The willingness to work together and maximise our resources is strong, and I we have no doubt that through continuing to work closely we can make significant contributions to the sport that we all care so much about.

We would also like to thank the dedicated TTA staff, who in a year of change in leadership have gone above and beyond to ensure that the organisation continued to not only deliver on core business but grow and deliver great outcomes.

Thank you once again to everyone for your contribution to our great game throughout 2023, it is a privilege to serve you all.

I also want to make special mention of Scott Houston, who in May completed an exceptional near-six years at the helm of Table Tennis Australia. Apart from overseeing unprecedented success at elite level, the significant strengthening of the Para Pathways Program under Scott's leadership ensures opportunities for athletes with a disability to pursue their potential. Paralympics Australia thanks Scott for his service and welcomes Nicole Adamson's appointment to the role of Chief Executive Officer, working alongside President Graham Symons.

# MESSAGE FROM AUSTRALIAN OLYMPIC COMMITTEE



Australia's participation in the Pacific Games in Solomon Islands was a high point in a very successful year for the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC).

As we approached the Olympic year in Paris, Australia's 70 strong team had an enjoyable and fruitful Games in Honiara. Importantly, the team left Honiara with 13 quota places in boxing and archery. Every team member secured a medal, competing in eight of the 24 sports being contested at the Games. The team was very grateful for the hospitality it received and left with wonderful memories as well as a medal haul of 50 gold, 24 silver and 10 bronze. The Australian Olympic Committee (AOC) has been deeply involved in preparations for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games throughout 2023.

By year's end, three athletes had been selected – Olympic champion Jess Fox (paddle), Chelsea Gubecka (swimming) and Breiana Whitehead (sailing) for the Team which is expected to number between 460-480 athletes.

Australian athletes from all our member sports have been striving to qualify for the Games at events at home and abroad, so they can put themselves into a position to join the Team heading to France.

Our Table Tennis athletes were very much a part of that endeavour. Australia swept the Oceania Qualifying Tournament in Townsville, winning the women's team, men's team and mixed doubles events, earning the maximum three Paris 2024 quotas per gender for Australia.

The Australians didn't drop a set in the teams event, with the men's team defeating New Zealand, Marshall Islands and Fiji, while the women were too strong for New Zealand and Fiji. We look forward to Table Tennis being well represented in Paris and proudly competing for their country.

We have an extraordinary group of Team leaders in place for Paris 2024 with Chef de Mission Anna Meares and her Deputy Chefs - Kenny Wallace, Bronwen Knox, Mark Knowles, Kyle Vander-Kuyp and Kaarle McCulloch.

Our first female Medical Director in Carolyn Broderick joins the experienced AOC headquarters team who are devoting themselves to the task of ensuring we provide the best possible high-performance environment for Australia's athletes in Paris.

Marking one Year to Go to Paris in July this year, the AOC unveiled its AllezAus campaign (meaning "Let's Go Australia" in French) with a special event in Sydney. Our thanks to our hosts Qantas for the use of their headquarters to showcase many of our athletes and sports that will bring us some much excitement at Games' time. While focused on Paris, the AOC has been deeply involved in ensuring the Olympic movement in this country is well placed to meet the needs of the future.

Brisbane 2032 represents a huge opportunity for our Olympic sports and athletes in nine years' time and beyond. The work to maximise that opportunity is on-going and, along with the eight other "Games Delivery Partners", we have been busy planning a lasting legacy to take us to the Games and for ten years beyond. A legacy that embraces not only Brisbane, Queensland and Australia, but also the entire Pacific region.

Through the Oceania National Olympic Committees (ONOC) Australia can play a critical role in our region. In April, AOC President Ian Chesterman was elected to the Board of ONOC at its General Assembly in Brisbane. Two months later Ken Wallace was elected to the ONOC Athletes' Commission so he can continue his very good work there.

The AOC launched its second Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) in March 2023. The "Innovate" RAP builds on the momentum established last year and is aimed at setting new goals so we can make a difference through the power of sport.

Our Innovate RAP commitments took us to Katherine in the Northern Territory where 12 Indigenous Coaches began their Australian Olympic Indigenous Coaching Scholarship program.

This partnership with Toyota has already seen four coaches graduate in basketball and we have now added swimming, hockey and athletics coaches into the scholarship program.

The coaches were given training and hands on experience in a program that will deliver further coaching modules in 2024.

The trip to Katherine also took Olympians into ten schools in the town and nearby communities, delivering the Olympics Unleashed program.

Importantly, the AOC can deliver this program in remote areas, as well as metropolitan Australia.

Olympics Unleashed continues to take Olympians and aspiring Olympians into Australian schools and communities, to inspire and motivate students to be their personal best by teaching students the importance of setting goals, overcoming challenges and finding their passion. Since the program began in 2018, some 339,478 students have received these presentations.

Olympics Unleashed has become the largest initiative the AOC has undertaken in its role of delivering educational programs based on the principles and values of Olympism to Australian schools connecting with metro, regional and remote schools and communities.

The program is free and has been overwhelmingly welcomed by Australia's schools and communities. In 2023, Olympics Unleashed continued to operate in five Australian States and Territories: Queensland, New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australia and Northern Territory.

Elsewhere in our community engagement, the AOC officially recognized 7 high schools in NSW as Australian Olympic Pathway Schools. In naming these Australian Olympic Pathway Schools, the AOC is recognising the extraordinary opportunities available for students to pursue their athletic journey. Students at the Sports High Schools are given access to high-quality sport training environments, sports academies, accredited coaches, support services (wellbeing, nutrition, etc) and crucially, formal pathways through to high performance teams with sports bodies. The NSW Sports High Schools have contributed more than thirty Olympians and Paralympians since Sydney 2000.

Now in its fifth year, the Australian Olympic Change-Maker™ program recognises students who are demonstrating the Olympic spirit - friendship, sportsmanship and striving for excellence – both on and off the playing field, through leadership and driving positive change in their school or local community.

High schools around Australia are invited to nominate two students from across years 10-12 who are demonstrating positive change in their communities. In 2023, nearly 1000 nominations were received, representing each state and territory.

*The Australian Olympic Change-Maker National Forum* was held on 12 September ahead of a National Summit in Canberra 5-7 December. Held at the Australian Institute of Sport, 26 students selected by a panel of Olympians had the unique opportunity to learn from and collaborate with Olympians including Brooke Hanson, Mack Horton, Sami Kennedy-Sim, Nathan Katz and aspiring Olympian Dr Rachael Gunn.

During the Summit, students came together to share their ideas on important issues facing sport in Australia. The students' recommendations focused on the themes of social inclusion, rural and remote opportunities, sustainability, and the benefits of sport in the Australian community. The Change-Makers presented their ideas to myself and Olympic gold medallist Chloe Dalton OAM at a presentation held at Parliament House.

All the AOC's community initiatives rely on the wonderful contribution of Australian Olympians to spread the Olympic message throughout the country. The commitment and efforts of Olympians to support the enormous scope of the AOC's work in the community has been outstanding.

As we approach Paris 2024, we wish all our athletes striving to represent their country on the Olympic stage all the very best.

Paris will be a wonderful Games and a great opportunity for our Pacific neighbours to show the world what they can do.

# MESSAGE FROM ITTF-OCEANIA



Qualification for the 2024 Paris Olympics was a major focus with Teams and Mixed Doubles spots up for grabs. The Australian pair of Nicholas Lum and Minhyung Jee secured the Mixed Doubles position in Paris with a come from behind victory over compatriots Finn Luu and Jian Fang Lay. Places in both the Men's Team and Women's Team events were secured with comprehensive victories over all opposition without the loss of a match.

The 2023 ITTF-Oceania Para Championships was held alongside the Pacific Games to minimise cost for countries and maximise participation. This was well received and there was a record total of 11 countries and 47 competitors attending the 2023 ITTF-Oceania Para Championships.

Australia's athletes competed to further their chances for positions at the Paris 2024 Paralympics including victories in the following singles classes:

- Daniela Di Toro Classes 2 – 5
- Chen Junjian Class 3
- Christopher Addis Class 4
- Nathan Pellissier Class 8
- Yang Qian Classes 7 – 10
- Ma Lin Classes 9 – 10

Australia won 24 out of 28 events at the ITTF-Oceania Senior & Youth Championships in Townsville. New Zealand was the only challenger, winning 4 events. Aditya Sareen rewrote the record books by becoming the youngest player ever to win the Men's singles title at 15 years and 134 days old. Yangzi Liu was dominant in the Women's Singles retaining her title without the loss of a game.

The Olympic Qualification events featured 24 competitors from 4 countries, while the Oceania Championships featured 75 competitors from 7 countries. Table Tennis Australia (TTA) had 10 officials participate, including the Referee and Deputy Referee. Townsville Table Tennis Association also had 16 volunteers.

The events featured continuous live streaming on the main show court table with a professional commentary team and there were a number of interviews on local TV.

Australian players once again dominated the ITTF-Oceania Cup, held in Hamilton, New Zealand on 9 – 10 December 2023. Yangzi Liu was in imperious form defeating Minhyung Jee in the final, securing the title without the loss of a game, while Nicholas Lum accounted for fellow Australian Aditya Sareen in straight games in the semi-final and Finn Luu 4 – 1 in the final.

Australia was well represented at a number of WTT events around the world and performed with distinction, underlying their continuous improvement at the elite level.

Australian players have achieved noteworthy top 100 Senior World Rankings including:

- 36 Nicholas Lum (Men's)
- 41 Aditya Sareen (Men's)
- 55 Finn Luu (Men's)
- 83 Xavier Dixon (Men's)
- 28 Yangzi Liu (Women's)
- 49 Minhyung Jee (Women's)
- 93 Jian Fang Lay (Women's)

On another note, 2023 was a year of change for TTA, with the resignations of CEO Scott Houston, Head Coach John Murphy and National Assistant Coach Simon Gerada. They can be proud of their many achievements during their tenure. ITTF-Oceania warmly welcomes Nicole Adamson as the new TTA CEO and we look forward to working cooperatively for the benefit of the Oceania region.

The 2023 Pacific Games was a great success with a record 15 countries competing. Tahiti dominated, winning Gold, Silver and Bronze in the Men's Singles and Silver and Bronze in the Women's Singles. The standout performers were Ocean Belrose (PYF) winning the Men's Singles and Priscila Tommy (VAN) winning the Women's Singles.

There were 4 World Table Tennis Day activities conducted in Oceania, with 3 of them in Australia.

The 2023 Oceania Hopes Week was held in Darwin Australia with 10 players from 2 countries (AUS & NZL). 15 Member Associations participated in a range of activities from the ITTF Participation Program across a number of areas, such as Para, Gender, Mentorship, Officials training, online training, training camps, equipment, youth grants, Hopes and the Quick Pathway Program.

Table Tennis Australia has generously invited Oceania countries to participate in the Australian National Championships and also TTA Tour events. It was notable that a number of New Zealand players took up the opportunity to compete in the Tour events and gain high level experience.

TTA has strong representation on the ITTF-Oceania Management Committee with Anthony Moore (President) and Scott Houston (Management Committee Member and ITTF Council representative).

Our Australian Government (DFAT) funded Smash Down Barriers (SDB) table tennis disability program continues to deliver sport for development outcomes for people with disability. In an exciting development we have received approval for the Solomon Islands to be added to the SDB Program in 2024.

Under the SDB program additional funding support was provided to film a video based on our Bounce it Back schools program. We were fortunate to be able to engage Australian Para athletes Trevor Hirth and Melissa Tapper for filming in both Fiji and Tonga. The video editing has now been completed and is being rolled out as a resource for schools in the Pacific.

We provided small equipment packages to 15 Member Associations in person at the ITTF-Oceania Championships and Pacific Games. Equipment support is critical to the development of table tennis in the Pacific and encourages participation.

We appreciate the support and close relationship with Table Tennis Australia and hope to work together on more initiatives to strengthen table tennis in Oceania.

We are grateful for the support provided by the Australian Government (DFAT), through the Pacific Sports Partnership. Funding for the Smash Down Barriers program exceeded A\$200,000 in 2023, and the Australian Government remains an invaluable partner of our sport-for-development initiatives.

ITTF-Oceania would like to thank the ITTF, OSFO, various Member Association National Olympic Committees, ONOC as well as Olympic Solidarity for their ongoing contribution to the sustainable development of table tennis in Oceania.

Additionally, ITTF-Oceania acknowledges the support of the Australian Government through Team Up to support the Smash Down Barriers table tennis disability program.



# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 DECEMBER 2023

## NOTE 1. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICY INFORMATION

The accounting policies that are material to the company are set out either in the respective notes or below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

### NEW OR AMENDED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS ADOPTED

The company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

### BASIS OF PREPARATION

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards - Simplified Disclosures issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB'), and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for not-for profit oriented entities.

### *Historical cost convention*

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### *Critical accounting estimates*

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is Table Tennis Australia Limited's functional and presentation currency.

### INCOME TAX

As the company is a tax exempt institution in terms of subsection 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

## NOTE 2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses.

Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results.

The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities

(refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

### *Revenue from contracts with customers*

Judgement is exercised in determining whether the performance obligations in government grants are 'sufficiently specific' to enable the revenue to be recognised under accounting standard AASB 15 *Revenue from contracts with customers*. Revenue from grants that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at a point in time or overtime.

Revenue received in advance is disclosed under current liabilities - contract liabilities. Refer note 3 and note 12.

## NOTE 2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS (CONTINUED)

Revenue from grants, that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the grant, or the right to receive the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the grant will flow to the company and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

### Lease term

The lease term is a significant component in the measurement of both the right-of-use asset and lease liability. Judgement is exercised in determining whether there is reasonable certainty that an option to extend the lease or purchase the underlying asset will be exercised, or an option to terminate the lease will not be exercised, when ascertaining the periods to be included in the lease term. In determining the lease term, all facts and circumstances that create an economical incentive to exercise an extension option, or not to exercise a termination option, are considered at the lease commencement date.

Factors considered may include the importance of the asset to the company's operations; comparison of terms and conditions to prevailing market rates; incurrence of significant penalties; existence of significant leasehold improvements; and the costs and disruption to replace the asset. The company reassesses whether it is reasonably certain to exercise an extension option, or not exercise a termination option, if there is a significant event or significant change in circumstances. Refer to note 13.

### Incremental borrowing rate

Where the interest rate implicit in a lease cannot be readily determined, an incremental borrowing rate is estimated to discount future lease payments to measure the present value of the lease liability at the lease commencement date. Such a rate is based on what the company estimates it would have to pay a third party to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset, with similar terms, security and economic environment. Refer to note 13.

The company recognises revenue as follows:

#### **Sale of goods**

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point in time when the customer obtains control of the goods, which is generally at the time of delivery.

#### **Services rendered to members**

Revenue derived from services delivered to members, includes membership registration fees, affiliation fees, educational income and player insurances (member service fees).

The company's membership and affiliation year is 1 January to 31 December, with fees payable annually in advance. Only those receipts that are attributable to the current financial year are recognised as revenue. Members pay in advance of receipt of services, which are delivered over a period of time.

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on either a fixed price or an hourly rate.

#### **Grants**

Grants that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at

a point in time or overtime. Such grants are classified as revenue from contracts with customers.

In respect of grants that are identified as revenue from contracts with customers, the amounts received in advance of the performance obligation in the grant agreement being met are recognised as contract liabilities and presented under the classification of current liabilities. The grant is recognised as revenue only when the company has met the specified performance obligation in the grant agreement, and has transferred the agreed benefit to the grantor.

Revenue from grants, that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the grant, or the right to receive the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the grant will flow to the company and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. Such grants are classified under *Other revenue*.

Grants provided to acquire or construct capital assets are recognised as a liability until such time as the asset is acquired or constructed, at which point the grant is recognised as revenue.

### NOTE 3. REVENUE (CONTINUED)

#### **Sponsorship**

Sponsorships that have sufficiently specific and enforceable performance obligations are recognised as revenue when the specified performance obligations are met, either at a point in time or overtime. Such sponsorships are classified as revenue from contracts with customers.

In respect of sponsorships that are identified as revenue from contracts with customers, the amounts received in advance of the performance obligation in the sponsorship agreement being met are recognised as contract liabilities and presented under the classification of current liabilities.

The sponsorship is recognised as revenue only when the company has met the specified performance obligation

in the sponsorship agreement, and has transferred the agreed benefit to the sponsor.

Revenue from sponsorships that do not have sufficiently specific and measurable performance obligations, is recognised when the company obtains control of the sponsorship, or the right to receive the sponsorship, it is probable that the economic benefits comprising the sponsorship will flow to the company and the amount of the sponsorship can be measured reliably. Such sponsorships are classified under *Other revenue*.

#### **Donations and other revenue**

Donations and other revenue are recognised when they are received or when the right to receive payment is established.

# TABLE TENNIS ACT REPORT

The major highlight for TTACT in 2023 was the National Veterans Championships played in Canberra from 30 September to 7 October. It was an overall success on the table as well as lots of fun. TTACT provided a large contingent with 55 members competing and were successful in coming away with:

- 2 Gold medals - Over 50s Men's Singles (Michael Bowrey) and Over 65s Men's Singles (Kim-Soon Tan); and
- Bronze medals in the Over 30s Men's Team (Faisal Pirwani, Arnab Rakshit, Geoff Chan and Stephen Phan) and Over 30s Men's Singles (Geoff Chan)

Phil Davis, National Championships Tournament Director, TTA, commented:

**"The Vets Championships were an outstanding success, supported significantly by the TTACT Board and members. Not only did ACT win a fantastic comparative amount of medals, but they won over visitors with their contribution to the national veteran's table tennis community. Simply awesome."**

The National Championships held in July at Sydney Olympic Park had the largest TTACT team in the history of the association. TTACT had Podium success with the Under 21 Team (Silver medal to Archie Webb, Toby Clarke and Ritchie Jiang) and seven medals and one award in Para.

Yasir Hussaini continues to develop his playing skills as a member of the Australian Paralympic squad. 2023 saw him participate in two prestigious international events - The 2023 ITTF Korea Para Open in Ulsan, South Korea and the regional Oceania Para Regional Championships in Honiara, Solomon Islands.

The 2023 training and playing season benefited from the structured coaching program, professionally delivered by TTACT's Head Coach George Logothetis and assistant coach Binesh Khaniya (Binesh was welcomed in July with growing demand for club coaching). Continuous positive feedback from players, parents and carers underlines the benefits of the formal training modules introduced to the junior, adult and para program by George and Binesh. Also a big thank you to our volunteer coaches.

2023 was a huge year for the TTACT coaching staff with 26-28 hours of group coaching delivered each week, 224 members (almost 50% of our membership base) participating in group coaching sessions, 300 children participating in table tennis through the Sporting School program; and training camps (open to all ages and all abilities) held each school holiday.

TTACT is very proud of the pathway program developed that provides opportunities throughout the year for Spinnerroos, minis, juniors, adults, females and para.

Another highlight was TTACT being the first club in Australia to offer Para Spinnerroos. The Program received support from an ACT Government Disability Inclusion Grant (\$3,500) and was delivered in partnership with TTA. 25 children with a disability participated in the 8 week program delivered in Term 4.

In January, TTACT expanded its venues for members to play at by hiring "The Dome at Fadden". Unfortunately, in June, a burst water pipe rendered this venue unusable. TTACT is being supported by ACT Government to explore new venue options with a \$55,000 grant to undertake a New Facility Feasibility Study.

Membership remained steady (460 members) under venue constraints with the Kingston Table Tennis centre (5 table tennis courts) in very high demand with an estimated 220-300 members visiting Kingston to play each day of the week.

The Club held successful tournaments (ACT Closed Championships in May, ACT Open Championships in August), organised pennants (4 Divisions each term) and supported members travelling to tournaments nationally and internationally.

TTACT players continued to develop through their participation in TTACT pennant, TTA Tour events, National Hopes Week, Country Championships (Gosford), National Championships and International Tournaments.

Social Seniors was held 3 mornings per week and Social Competitions, held during school holidays, continued to be popular. Tuggeranong (casually hired venue) remains strong and links with the University of Canberra and ANU were strengthened.

TTACT participated in a Governance review of ACT Sporting Organisations and received positive feedback on all governance benchmarks. A key focus identified for 2024 was "Participation and Membership". The Annual Survey of Club members continued to provide valuable feedback to the Board and expanding places to play continued to be a key issue for members as identified in Table Tennis in the ACT Strategic Plan 2023-25.

A big thank you to all volunteers including Board and Committee members and outgoing Tournament Director (Sam Miller). Training of volunteers continued to be supported through delivery of TOPS and Level 1 Coaching courses. Thank you for generous member donation (\$5,000); sponsorships by Joola (\$4,000) and Eastlake Football Club (meeting rooms), TTA (MOU) and ACT Government (grants).

Thank you to everyone who loves the game of table tennis and looking forward to a fabulous 2024.

# TABLE TENNIS NEW SOUTH WALES REPORT

2023 began a new era in Sports Management and reporting structures across all pathways and partnerships. We welcome the opportunity to actively participate and workshop policies and development programs with our strategic partners – NSW Office of Sport and Table Tennis Australia.

All 97 Sports in NSW have benefited from a campaign by another Sport Partner, “Sport NSW”, who lobbied heavily with both State Government parties to orchestrate a NSW Office of Sport redesign which was well and truly overdue. The election promise is well under way for the redesign of the NSW Office of Sport – Organisational Support Program. This will bring all sports in NSW into closer alignment with all other States and Territories in Australia. A huge thanks to Stuart Hodge and his team at Sport NSW for a highly successful campaign which is deeply appreciated by Table Tennis NSW, giving us transparency, and providing opportunities to grow our sport.

We have been working closely with Table Tennis Australia across many platforms to achieve mutually beneficial outcomes and reach targets.

We enjoy a new strategic Plan 2023–25 aligned with Table Tennis Australia and have also entered a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) which was developed in lieu of hosting National events. Part of the MOU provides additional funding to engage our school's Development Officer in a full-time role. Other benefits include:

#### **Table Tennis Australia:**

- Pays the per player fee for registered members to use Ratings Central Australia to upload their members results.
- Provides High Performance training for NSW members who are in National Squads.
- Runs programs for Spinners and Para Multi Sport Come & Try days.
- Administers the TTA Equipment grants to clubs.
- Covers the Annual fee for Revolutionise Sport.
- Manages the Sporting Schools Program.
- Provides Annual Volunteer Awards.
- Manages the National Insurance Program.

We have been actively involved in workshops for the membership model review, actively involved in both the Gender Equity Strategy and the Women & Girls Action Plan and have attended monthly meetings with Table Tennis Australia to workshop ideas between States and TTA Staff (with CEOs or operational members from other States and Territories.)

The new Ways of Working initiative has been highly successful with the use of a facilitator who contacts each State to gather pre-meeting information. Being able to benefit from each other's different skill sets is an extremely important tool as we work towards a more collaborative sport.

NSW achieved good results at all the National Championships. We provided teams for all divisions of Juniors, Open and Youth, for several Teams for Para and for most age groups for Veterans. Table Tennis NSW congratulates all players selected to represent Australia at International events both here in Australia and overseas.

Our social media team has been making gradual progress across a number of social media platforms.

The majority of our workforce are all volunteers, so a huge congratulations to all who contribute countless hours of work behind the scenes. Our tournament committee usually spends 12 hours a day over 2 days to deliver our highly successful tournaments. Our tournament numbers have increased significantly in the Junior and Open tournaments while the Veterans are level in the tournament numbers. We can always use additional helpers on tournament days.

We thank our valuable major sponsors who continue to support us: NSW Office of Sport, Table Tennis Australia, Table Tennis World and ACY Securities. These sponsors provide important contributions, so we are able to grow our sport.

# TABLE TENNIS NORTHERN TERRITORY REPORT

2023 has been a steady year maintaining similar results to 2022. Once again, we successfully hosted another round of the World Table Tennis Youth Contender in Darwin with somewhat depleted volunteers and continued to seek further development of the Alice Springs region. The Darwin TT Association has been steadily growing in committee support whilst a lack of committee members in the Alice Springs region has hampered club progress and achievement of participation targets.

## PARTICIPATION

Darwin hosted the 2023 WTT Youth Contender Darwin event in September/October, together with an international Youth Training Camp and an Oceania Junior Development Camp both hosted by ITTF High Performance Elite Coach Massimo Costantini. In addition, an International Umpires training course and exams were held. Player numbers were significantly up on the previous year following a recovery from the COVID-19 impact. Over 100 players participated from China, Taiwan, Singapore, Australia, India, Malaysia, Korea and NZ. Medals were shared between Chinese Taipei, Singapore, Australia, and India, with the Australian juniors demonstrating significant improvement in international competitiveness. Two local Darwin juniors participated, Runshu Li and Sebastian Lai who both impressed the Local audience with outstanding play against a strong international field. TTNT is contracted to run the event again in 2024 once again with the opportunity for Australian players to compete at the international level.

Darwin has seen steady growth in the morning seniors' social activity with a doubling of sessions and extra volunteers.

## GOVERNANCE

TTNT level governance was strong, with NT benchmarks very largely achieved, and with diversity of revenue increasing. TTNT has received strong financial support from the NT Government to assist with ongoing programs and in particular 2023 WTT Youth Contender Darwin event in Darwin. Commitment to the TTA/TTNT MOU has enabled further alignment to national strategies and additional financial support. The National Integrity Framework and related policies were adopted by TTNT with some potential minor mods flagged in late 2023.

TTNT welcomed the Katherine Area as an Associate Member and looks forward to more formal arrangements and development in this region. However, there continues to be a shortfall in volunteers at all clubs administration levels which held back club development and achievement of participation targets. A full resurrection of the Alice Springs Club remains a priority, as is a further development of the Darwin committee members.

## PERFORMANCE

TTNT continued with the High-Performance squad, a big thank you to Jonathan Tong who provided ongoing specialist coaching and support to the NT team at the 2023 National Juniors. Elfrida Kalich has continued to provide essential development of entry-level junior players with a steady increase throughout 2023. Michael Pastrikos has returned to Darwin and commenced support with the Junior programs.

Solid achievements were made at the National Veterans Championships. The NT >80 men's team of TT Lee and Joe Abrantes won bronze. Elfrida Kalich assisted the Presidents Over 70's Women's Team to achieve Silver and Elfrida excelled in winning gold in the >70 Women's Singles and >70 Mixed Doubles and collecting another two individual silver medals as well.

## PERFORMANCE

The WTT Youth contender and Local promotions in Darwin and Palmerston (Chinese New Year events, Come and Try Events) contributed to raising the profile of table tennis in the NT, achieving local TV, Newspaper and Social Media coverage. The Live video coverage of the Youth Contender event was repeated with significant international post reach.

TTNT has supported DTTA in several "be inclusive" community fun events run by "clubhouse territory" providing networking and profile opportunities to the greater community.

# TABLE TENNIS QUEENSLAND REPORT

In this, my fifth year as President of Table Tennis Queensland (TTQ), we navigated through significant challenges and celebrated notable achievements. The onboarding of a new Executive Officer, Damon Selwyn joining TTQ, presented a unique challenge. With only one week for a handover before Jason Walsh finished, was nothing short of outstanding. Jason had been an integral part of TTQ for 11 years and Damon has picked up the reins, facing unprecedented challenges this year, and worked closely with the Board to build on laid foundations from CEOs past. Jason chose to leave us to become a home dad and the Board would like to once again acknowledge Jason for his service, loyalty, and dedication over the years.

Damon hit the ground running securing numerous cash sponsors and in-kind partnerships to strengthen our state events program and offer affiliates and members value added benefits. These partnerships have resulted in tangible savings for TTQ, while also learning and fitting into his role which he has done admirably.

We welcomed a new Table Tennis Australia CEO Nicole Adamson, who I might add has grappled with a similar hand over of the reins issue with TTA. Nicole has brought a renewed partnership between TTQ and TTA and I am pleased to add that with cooperation at an all time high, TTQ is looking forward to even stronger working relationships.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) in April 2023 resulted in the election of a dedicated board: President Terry Morato, Vice President Trevor Barrett, Secretary Lukas Kozak, Treasurer Jason Hocking's, and Board Members Venkat Vangaveti, Janice Kent, Simon Mills, and Vanessa Paulsen.

There has been substantial change in the Queensland government's funding model for all sporting organisations in the State, shifting to a base funding model with participation grants available on a project basis. This led to a substantial reduction in our fixed guaranteed income. Regrettably, this forced the board to make the difficult decision to part ways with our Admin Officer, Karen after her 15 years of loyal service.

We express our deepest gratitude for her unwavering commitment and service over that time to TTQ and wish her all of the best in her future endeavours.

TTQ once again promoted various TTA programs including Spinnerroos, which is a great platform for people to take up the sport at a young age. The Qld Hopes competition was held in four regions across QLD, which culminated in a successful final held in Brisbane. TTQ are pleased to have provided support to four players, Manasee Sivayoganathan (Northern region), Pranav Prasad, Han Leung and Jaden Cao from the Southern region, by covering their entry fees for the National Hopes Week & Challenge held in Geelong.

It is encouraging to see clubs being innovative with events such as: Business challenges, Seniors events such as Bat and Chat, Townsville participating with TTQ in the Challenge Games Event for disabled children (sponsored by QPM) and also Swish Table Tennis for the visually impaired (sponsored by Bunnings). It is also great to see our affiliate clubs hold fund-raising and participation events (such as Bunnings Barbecues, come and try days and active displays at shopping centres Etc) made possible through the PL insurance protection provided to clubs as part of their annual affiliation.

The Qld Open Championships held in Bundaberg, received sponsorship from Everything Fleet and QLD Pacific Metals sponsored the Qld Juniors event in Townsville. Damon's efforts secured additional member benefits from Quest Hotels & Apartments and Everything Fleet, showcasing a strong support network for our sport. TTQ was also proud to be a part of the Olympic mixed doubles qualifier and Oceania Championships held in Townsville with a Qld player being selected for the Paris Olympics. Congratulations to Min Jee on her selection.

Special thanks to Everything Fleet for providing a bus free of charge to transport the QLD coaches supporting our state teams attending the National Juniors and Seniors in Sydney. Queensland sent an impressive delegation, including 14 junior teams, 3 senior teams, 10 para players, 10 coaches and team managers.

QLD also sent 23 teams to compete in the National Veterans Championships held in Canberra. TTQ were pleased to be able to provide support to all teams and coaching staff at both AUS Championships with subsidies of national team fees and other associated event costs, to ensure we can send as many QLD athletes to participate in these coveted events as possible. There were some standout results at the AUS Championships in 2023, including Andrea McDonnell (C), Clare Owen, Jan Yu & Helen Zhang who picked up Gold in the O60 Women's Teams and Colin Gradwell, Thomas Samuelsson & Martin Solomons (C) who also picked up Gold in the O75 Men's Teams at the Veterans Championships. Standout performance at the AUS Nationals included Taleisha Gaeta (Best Player Award – U15 Girls), Jingyu Huang (U13 Boys Champion & U13 Boys Best Player Award), Lucas Green & Taleisha Gaeta (Gold in U15 Doubles) and Jingyu Huang & Ella Yu (Gold in U13 Mixed Doubles).

I would like to thank our High-Performance coach Mathew Pettit and HP committee, our State Selectors, our Officiating Committee, Referees and Umpires for their service throughout the year. You have all performed admirably and without whom our state events would not eventuate.

TTQ organised a number of successful Tops and Level 1 coaching courses, with fees once again being subsidised. As a result, we were able to maximise the opportunity for more coaches in QLD to receive national accreditation.

The TTQ Qld Schools Championships were an even larger success this year with over 250 school students competing throughout the state and traveling to the finals held in Brisbane in December. Thank you to our regional clubs for their support with a special mention to Rockhampton and Bundaberg for the number of competitors entered from their region.

This year marked significant milestones for two clubs in Qld — Ipswich Spinners, who celebrated their 90th year, and Rockhampton Table Tennis who also reached this impressive milestone. I had the honour of being invited and attending the Ipswich Spinners event. This event was exceptionally well-run and showcased the past and future of a successful club in Qld.

In response to overwhelming requests from our member clubs to abolish the long time imposed development levy, TTQ conducted club meetings and surveys, allowing clubs to have one-on-one discussions with the Executive Officer. A special general meeting resulted in a new fee structure and fixed Affiliation agreement for a two-year term, encouraging clubs to boost their participation and membership numbers, while also creating more incentive for new affiliates to join TTQ. The 2024 Board, in conjunction with a National working group and invited affiliates will be providing input and feedback towards a National Membership Model review in 2024.

We congratulate a number of Queensland Volunteers were also recognised at the Table Tennis Australia Volunteer Awards. These included Morrie Bligh (50 Years of Service Award), Brendan Gaeta (Male Administrator of the Year Award) and Yudong Shi (Male High-Performance Coach of the Year Award).

I would also like to recognise and congratulate our TTQ award recipients for their achievements in 2023. Yudong Shi (Club Coach of the Year), Matthew Pettett (Representative Coach of the Year), Brendan Gaeta (Official of the Year) and Peter Marris (Volunteer of the Year). We also recognised our players of the year in various categories, including Taleisha Gaeta (Junior Female Player of the Year), Jacob Jingyu Huang (Junior Male Player of the Year), Danni-Elle Townsend (Senior Female Player of the Year), Ben Gould (Senior Male Player of the Year), Ann-Louise Stewart (Veteran Female Player of the Year), Thomas Samuelsson (Veteran Male Player of the Year), Gemma Buchholz (Para Female Player of the Year) and Daryl Sterling (Para Male Player of the Year).

2023 has presented many challenges for Table Tennis in Qld and Australia and I would like to sincerely thank the Board for their support. For the members whose 2-year term is now completed and who are once again up for re-election, I wish them all the best. To Simon Mills who has moved to Canberra and leaves the board and will not be seeking re-election, many thanks for your service to TTQ and your valued input over your time on the Board.

Despite all the challenges faced this year, the Table Tennis community in Queensland has shown resilience, dedication, and continued growth. We look forward to building on these foundations in the coming year.

# TABLE TENNIS SOUTH AUSTRALIA REPORT

As we close another year, I am pleased to present the President's Report for Table Tennis South Australia (TTSA) for the 2023 calendar year. Reflecting on our 2023 journey, we began the year with a mix of anticipation and uncertainty, primarily due to the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on our sport. However, I am pleased to report that our resilience and adaptability as a sporting community have allowed us to navigate these challenges successfully, leading to a year of significant achievements and progress.

## REFLECTION ON 2022 AND OUTLOOK FOR 2023

The uncertainties of 2022, particularly concerning the 'lag' impact of COVID on our sport, presented us with unique challenges. Despite these, our sport's strength and commitment ensured that these impacts were largely mitigated. While the anticipated collaboration for a new sporting venue did not materialise as expected, the process provided us with valuable insights and learnings for future considerations.

The slow 'bounce back' in tournament participation was a concern, but it also fuelled our determination to revitalize and promote engagement across all age groups. Our efforts to reconnect with key stakeholders, including government agencies, schools, and coaching communities, have been fruitful, laying a solid foundation for future growth.

## KEY ACHIEVEMENTS OF 2023

Our achievements in 2023 have been wide-ranging, touching on operational efficiency, recognition, financial security, and on-court successes:

### OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCY

We dedicated significant efforts to enhance our operational frameworks, including the update and expansion of our website and the efficient management of the Winter Pennant. The previous development of our user-friendly guide for Star Club accreditation has been instrumental in supporting our clubs and affiliates with a reliable and dependable governance framework.

## RECOGNITION AND FINANCIAL SECURITY

Building social membership levels remained a priority, alongside managing member disputes and securing crucial funding for our High Performance Programs. The grant for Leadership and Policy has been pivotal in strengthening our governance and strategic direction.

## ON-COURT SUCCESSSES

The hosting of state titles across various categories and the successful conduct of the Country Carnival Tournament stand out. Our social media presence and the continued year on year success of our grass roots program, Smash Hits, has provided a fantastic platform for community engagement and visibility.

## HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAMS

The transition of leadership in our High Performance Programs to Kay Crowell marked a new chapter in our pursuit of excellence. The reinvigoration of these programs is a testament to our commitment to nurturing talent and enabling our athletes to compete at the highest levels.

## LOOKING AHEAD

The year 2023 has been a testament to our sport's resilience and dedication. As we look to 2024, our focus remains on growth, engagement, and continuous improvement. The lessons learned from the Winter Pennant and the enhancements to our match play rules reflect our commitment to inclusivity and excellence. Our growing social media following, and the active engagement of our affiliates underscore the vibrant community we have built.

The increase in social memberships and the active use of our website highlight the growing interest and participation in table tennis within South Australia. The success of programs like Smash Hit further emphasises the potential for growth and engagement at the grassroots level.

Nationally Scott Houston stepped down as CEO of TTA which has led to a new CEO and a change of approach at the national level.

Congratulations to Port Sorell Table Tennis and Deloraine Table Tennis for their continued growth, particularly in the junior ranks, – for our sport to survive we need the injection of young players.

At the recent National Veterans championships in Canberra several Tasmanian players performed very well resulting in national rankings – Judy Blackburn and Irina Sakova – congratulations to both.

TTT acknowledge the support of the Tasmanian State Government and Bulk Nutrients which has enabled the organisation to provide coaching and support to a number of clubs.

A number of training / qualification courses for coaches, umpires and officials were conducted during the past year and we look forward to a continuation of that arrangement. In 2024 the National Veterans Championships will be held at the Silverdome in Launceston and there will be a need for local clubs to provide some support to ensure the event is a successful one and that we continue to hold such a major event.

Finally my thanks to the Board who have been supportive during the year and some personal thanks to several of TTT's Directors, namely:

Pauline Yew, who as Finance Director, kept the organisation running from a financial viewpoint. Pauline has advised she will not be standing for election in 2024 so I wish her well in future endeavours.

Geoff Long, our Director Administration, who kept us abreast of the changes in Table Tennis administration over the year and kept TTT rolling along.

# TABLE TENNIS VICTORIA REPORT

2023 has been a big year for table tennis in Victoria which would not have been possible without our wonderful affiliates and members.

Reflecting on our key strategic objectives it has been an excellent year of table tennis growth and development across Victoria.

## PARTICIPATION

- Participation numbers for 2023 were 62,730 .
- Membership increased by 13% from 2022 with 4,548 members at the end of 2023.
- We welcomed 9 new affiliates to the TTV family which included 6 new Victorian table tennis venues.
- We completed a Victorian Membership Model Review which will be the basis for a national review in 2024 with the hope of introducing a new membership model in 2025.

## PROFILE

- We increased the number of TTV commercial partnerships from 2 to 5 partners resulting in funding to invest in Victorian Open prizemoney, the 2022 Awards function and the 2023 Corporate Cup.
- We launched our Take it to the Table Marketing Campaign activated through branding, messaging, a video, merchandise and a pop-up event at Grazeland.
- Our TTV digital channels grew by an average of 19% across Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn & eNewsletter.
- We explored new ways to build our profile including collaborating with Nova radio station, Fox Footy and Grazeland.

## PATHWAYS

- We established a new State Pathways Program led by Olympian and State Pathways Coach David Powell with sessions conducted at MSAC and piloted with regional clubs in late 2023.

- We delivered another robust year of State Tournament Circuit events with a total of 29 tournaments.
- We maintained strong representation of Victorian athletes in National Squads and had outstanding results at the Junior, Senior, Youth & Para National Championships and the National Veterans Championships.
- We had 64 individuals complete TOPS, Level 1 and State Umpire courses with 36 gaining accreditations so far.

## POTENTIAL

- We diversified our revenue streams with both commercial partnerships and successfully received three different government grants (coach/official support, pop-up event & regional participation).
- We ensured there were multiple opportunities to connect with affiliates throughout the year through in-person forums, online sessions and surveys.
- TTV strengthened our collaboration with Table Tennis Australia through signing an MOU committing to explore how we can work together for the greater good of table tennis in Australia.

These results in 2023 could not have been achieved without our fantastic TTV staff team of Events and Club Officer Oscar Yam, Participation and Marketing Officers James Maxwell and Noah Newnham and State Pathways Coach David Powell. We also thank all of our TTV partners, plus those who sit on TTV committees and those who take on voluntary leadership and officiating roles, for their support during 2023.

Lastly, I would like to thank the TTV Board for their guidance and trust in me as CEO of this great organisation. Although I will spend the majority of 2024 on parental leave, I know the organisation will be in great hands with interim CEO Andrew Weiss and I look forward to following another great year of growth and progress.

# TABLE TENNIS WESTERN AUSTRALIA REPORT

2023 has been a successful year as TTWA built upon its success in 2022 and continued to restore the association back to a healthy position financially. Membership numbers continue to rise and are heading towards pre-COVID levels. Membership of TTWA was 340 members in November 2023.

The decision in 2022 to hire a part-time administrator/CEO to take on many TTWA administrative tasks continued to be a great asset to the members. Officials, volunteers and members could focus on operational tasks associated with running TTWA events, tournaments and programs knowing that administrative tasks are being undertaken to support these initiatives.

I would like to take this opportunity to recognise the dedication and contributions of each of the Board Members, who all volunteer their time and effort for free, which often goes unnoticed. We now have a board of equality and at 31 December 2023 had 4 female board members - Claudia Harlan, Becky Bennett, Lisa Correia and Jessika Nichols-Neale. The TTWA strategy is to lead by example and we are hoping that by having board equality with female board members to champion women's needs in the sport of Table Tennis, this will lead to an increase in more female participants in our sport and encourage women to get involved in officiating and volunteering.

## The association successfully ran the following events and tournaments:

- Summer, Winter, and Spring Pennants
- West Coast Open tournament
- WA Open State Championships
- TOP 12 tournament
- Adult Grand Prix
- Table Tennis events for the Transplant Games held in Perth
- Hosted a corporate cup for Asthma Foundation

All events were held at our TTWA Centre in East Victoria Park. Although we are limited by space we were able to rearrange the tables as required to make a suitable space to hold events of a high standard. As well as provide space for spectators, officials, the tournament director and assistants.

Due to the lack of catering facilities, we hired a food truck for the WA Open State championship event which gave players and spectators an additional lunch option.

## VIC PARK CENTRE

TTWA received a sustainability grant to invest in the following:

- LED lighting upgrade
- Solar panel installation

The LED lighting not only provides better visibility for the play during all hours but it is also more energy efficient saving TTWA money on our electricity bill. Likewise the installation of solar panels has enabled TTWA to take advantage of the 300 days of sunshine a year in WA and use free energy from the sun to power our centre and charge the solar battery for power to use later after daylight hours are finished for the day.

## WA PLAYER REPRESENTATION AT NATIONAL & INTERNATIONAL LEVEL

What an excellent year 2023 has been for our junior, AWD and veteran players picking up so many medals and awards throughout the year. Congratulations and we should all be proud of their achievements. See the players list later in this report.

## TABLE TENNIS AUSTRALIA (TTA)

TTWA has a good working relationship with TTA and appreciate their continued support. TTWA looks forward to continued collaboration with TTA and hosting future national events in WA.

## MOVING FORWARD

After a successful 2023 with event and tournaments, TTWA is aiming even higher in 2024,

- Plan building façade project
- Successfully support TTA to run the National championship in Mandurah in July
- Complete the required constitution re-work.
- Increase membership levels, particularly more female participation.
- Encourage clubs to run more TTWA sanctioned tournaments

TTWA would like to thank WA Dept. of Sports and Recreation and Table Tennis Australia for the grants and assistance throughout 2023 and look forward to continued collaboration in 2024.
